Democratic City Convention.

Pursuant to the call published last week, the Democrats of the city of Albany met in Convention at the Court House, in Albany, on Thursday evening, November 29, 1866...

The object of the meeting was stated by Geo. R. Helm to be the nomination of candidates for the several city offices, the election to take place on Monday, December 3, 1866.

On motion, a Committee of three persons, consisting of Hon. G. R. Helm, Dr. Alexander and J. B. Comley, were appointed to report on the order of business.

After some more necessary preliminary proceedings, the Convention proceeded to the nomination of candidates, with the following result:

Mr. Cranor offered the following resolutions, which were, on motion, unanimously adopted:

Resolved, 1st. That we are in favor of taking immediate steps to secure the property of the citizens of the city of Albany against the ravages of fire.

2d. That we hereby instruct the nominees of this Convention, if elected, to take steps for the thorough organization of a fire company.

COLONEL ROSS.—We have several subscribers on our list who, when they lived in Illinois, knew Colonel Wm. Ross, then and now of Pittsfield, Illinois. For the information of all such we state that, six or eight months ago, the Colonel's consort, Mrs. Ross, fell sick and died, and was buried in the burial ground west of town. We do not know the precise age of Colonel Ross, but we judge it to be between seventy and seventy-five. He some years ago retired from business. Years ago he wore an entire set of false teeth; and for some six or eight years he has been blind in one eye and nearly so in the other. In 1863 he took a trip to Europe and visited a celebrated German oculist, but the physician could render him no material service; and when he returned to Pittsfield he could see men only as "trees walking," and he had to be led almost everywhere he went, as a consequence. A letter from Pittsfield recently received informs us that the gallant Colonel had just married again! And whom do you suppose he wedded? The woman of his choice this time is Miss Hannah Kellogg—a maiden lady of some forty or forty-five summers—Her brother, Daniel Kellogg, some ten years ago married one of the Colonel's daughters; and Marcellus Ross—the eldest son of the Colonel—married a sister of Mr. Kellogg. So that by the marriage Colonel Ross has just contracted he becomes the brother-in-law of his son-in-law and the uncle of his grand children; his daughter-in-law becomes his sister-in-law, and the mother of his son-in-law becomes his mother-in-law. If he should be blessed with off-spring (which is not improbable) they would be cousins to his grand-children! If this isn't mixing things up tolerably lively we are mistaken. But it all goes to show the innate vim and snap of the gallant Colonel.

TRAP BOGARD.—The last issue of the Unionist denounced Cook, the cripple, at some length as an impostor, &c.
