Oregon is the most western portion of the Uni-ted States; was organized as a Territory on the 2d of May, 1842, and was admitted into the Union on the 12th of February, 1859. It is bounded on the north by Washington Territory, from which it is separated by the Columbia river and the 46th parallel of north latitude; east, by a line from the mouth of the Owyhee river, due south to the par-allel of 42° north; south along said parallel, to the Pacific; and on the west by the Pacific ocean. It lies between 42° and 46°20' north latitude, and between 109°30' and 124°30' west longitude. narrow str ps of country lying around the coast etween the mountains and the sea are very rich and productive, but the difficulty of communica-

ion has hitherto retarded their settlement. The Willamette Valley, lying distant about forty miles from the ocean, and parallel with the coast separated from it by the coast range of mountains is 180 miles in length, and from 40 to 60 miles in width. The land is principally prairie, of fine soil, well timbered, and watered by mountain streams, which empty near the centre of the Valley into the Williamette river, which is navigated by steamboats its entire length during one-half of AGRICULTURAL PRODUCTS.

The lands in the Willamette Valley are very roductive. Wheat, oats, barley, vegetables, etc., yield largely. It is believed to be the finest wheat growing region in the United States. South of the Willamette, toward California, are the Umpqua and Regue river valleys. They are more limited than the Willamette, but have the same general characteristics. The climate is more mild, and tobacco grows to perfection. The wild grass is very fine, and the number of cattle, horses and sheep raised is very large.
