NEW YORK, Feb. 1.—A World's special says it is authorized to state most confidently and decidedly that the litigation on Great Britain which have been too meekly urged by Secretary Seward, are about being forced at whatever cost or hazard.

The British Minister will be presented on Tuesday. Although the speeches may be guarded, the fact remains that a speedy and satisfactory response must be made by the British Government to the President's demand, or a declaration of war will eventually ensue.

A Tribune's special makes substantially the same assertion. WASHINGTON, Feb. 3.—An authentic rumor prevails in Congressional circles that Minister Adams has resigned his position.

The President-to-day appointed Wisconsin Commissioner of Internal Revenue, to succeed Rollins. He will probably not be confirmed.

Kit Carson arrived last night, accompanied by one of the principal Utah chiefs, on a visit in reference to treaty matters. The Times' special says: It is ascertained that the President has actually issued an order to Gen. Grant, forbidding him from obeying orders received from the Secretary of War. Grant declined to obey, whereupon a spicy correspondence ensued, which lasted two weeks. It covers not only the matter named, but a charge by the President that Grant shows duplicity in his action in leaving the War Department. This correspondence is official and will probably be published.

The House passed a resolution calling on the State Department for all copies of correspondence with the President in relation to the termination of his powers as Secretary of War. It is stated that the charges against Judge Field grew out of a private conversation with a Senator, in which Field said he was opposed to impartial negro suffrage at present. Also, he thought a more conservative tendency of the Government beneficial.

It is stated that Seward hopes to induce Minister Adams to withdraw his resignation. NEW YORK, Feb. 3.—It is reported that the February statement of the public debt shows an increase of nearly 20,000,000, owing to a decrease in the revenue. There is an increasing demand for first mortgage bonds of the Central Pacific Railroad, caused by a further advance on the price to par and interest.

Arrived—Ship Retford, 150 days from New York; bark Delaware, 133 days from Guernsey. Flour—Trade quiet at unchanged rates. Sale of 100 barrels Orange extra, in half sacks, at \$3 25. The absence of any receipts from Oregon during the past four weeks has greatly strengthened the market.

Wheat—Sale 1,500 sacks good shipping at \$2 70. Barley—Sale of 2,850 sacks choice brewing at \$1 82 1/2. The market presents a healthier tone, though there is still a wide range for feed and brewing at \$1 70 to \$1 85, with but little doing at the inside price.

Oats—Market firm at \$1 75 to \$1 90, for light to choice. SAVAGE TALK.—The Soldiers' and Sailors' Union, of Washington, D. C., held a meeting in this city on the 9th ult., at which it was expected that Henry D. Washburne would make an address; but not being forthcoming at the appointed time, Colonel Moss, of Missouri, a Radical orator of itinerant habits, whose field of labor has been for some time confined to the Southern States, took the stand, and in talking of the progress the negroes had made since their emancipation, mentioned the fact that at the present moment there are three hundred and ten thousand of them trained to arms, with competent leaders of their own well able to lead them, and fully determined to maintain the rights they have recently acquired. Digressing from the subject, he thought the Radical party had suffered a defeat in the past week, but if the New England men had only a little of the spirit of the old Roundheads they would not only have impeached a bad ruler, but brought his head to the block. This sentiment was loudly applauded. In conclusion he expressed a hope that through consolation to his spirit, that the South, when loyally reconstructed, would send up black Radical members of Congress with enough of the inflexible vertebrae to carry out the impeachment to its proper issue. General British spoke afterward, and made a series of complaints against the Kentucky rebels who ostracized Union men from participation in their social enjoyments.—Call.
