Oregon is the most western portion of the United States; was organized as a Territory on the 2d of May, 1843, and was admitted into the Union on the 12th of February, 1859. It is bounded on the north by Washington Territory, from which it is separated by the Columbia river and the 46th parallel of north latitude; east, by a line from the month of the Owyhee river, due south to the parallel of 42° north; south along said parallel, to the Pacific; and on the west by the Pacific ocean. It lies between 42° and 46°20' north latitude, and between 109°30' and 124°30' west longitude. The country is principally mountainous. Some narrow strips of country lying around the coast between the mountains and the sea are very rich
