Two Radical papers in Salem have at-

fended by the ablest of counsel, we have but
little doubt he will be acquitted. After the
case shall have undergone judicial investi-
gation we may have a little to say in reply
to what has been said by the Radical papers.

with crime prior to legal investigation is
frequently fraught with pernicious conse-
quences and sometimes helps to subvert the
ends of justice; and it is often the case that
if these villifiers were required to throw the
first stone at their victim, they would sink
