THE RAILROAD.-Hitherto we have no devoted that attention to the proposed Railroad which its importance demands, in consequence of our time being almost entirely engrossed with the recent election. We intend to make amends in the future.

We regret to say that, from some cause, in this market : our men of means in this community, manifest an apathy, or stoical indifference to the road which, to us, is unaccountable in view of surrounding facts and circumstances. Some object that the contractors will make too much in the operation. They agree to build the road, and put it in complete running order for \$35,000 per mile. We do not think this exorbitant, considering all things. The Illinois Central Railroad, much of which runs over a fine, level prairie country, cost \$20,000 per mile; and it was constructed before the war, when labor railroad iron, and everything entering into the construction of a railroad was about as cheap again as at present. It is undoubtedly true that the contractors will make money when the road shall be completed. They admit this through their accredited agents. Mr. Mitchell, in his address in Albany on the Railroad question, frankly stated, again and again, that the contractors expected to make money by the enterprise. Capitalists will not engage in such undertakings unless they can be quite well assured that they will make money thereby. We are of the opinion that the contract for the building of the O. Central Railroad, east side, is as fair and liberal on the part of the capitalists, as will eyer be obtained by the people of Oregon.

We cannot notice, at this time, all the ob jections urged by some of our Rip Van Winkle property-holders, to the contract. Our view of the matter may be expressed very briefly. It is this : The road will be built whether you take stock or not. The contractors have already spent too much money, and have become too deeply involved to go backwards. If the real estate owners of Albany and vicinity do not manifest proper interest in the success of the enterprise. the road will not run through nor near this city. It is a mistake to suppose that the route is unalterably located. It is not; but it will be in a few weeks under the engineer and Mr. Douthitt. If the monied men of Albany do not encourage the undertaking, of its merit and cheapness, it had, in 1867, a cirit will run ten or fifteen miles east of Al-bany, thus taking a nearly direct line, and improved. It will contain materially reducing the cost of its construcsion, and running through the richest and most fertile section of country in Oregon. A depot will be built, and a rival town will spring up there; and if it do not kill, it will surely very seriously cripple the city of Albany. This is not a mere idle threat. There are plenty of able farmers along on the line of such a route who will gladly subscribe all the stock, and even more, which
