THE MOUNTAIN ROAD.—We have just passed over the road running from Albany over the Cascade mountains; and as some are anxious to know its condition at present we will say that, as a general fact, it is one of the best mountain roads of which we have any knowledge. But, owing to the fact that unusually large quantities of rain have recently fallen, and also that several large droves of cattle have been driven over the road on the mountain is considerably cut in sandy places. Some of the fords, too, quite rocky; that is, large rocks have been washed down into the fords by the strong current of the Santiam—making the fords very rough, and when the water is high, a little dangerous. Mr. Warner, of this place, had one of the wheels of a light wagon pretty effectually smashed up in crossing "rocky ford," but being an original genius, he manufactured another with an ax and went on his way rejoicing. At present the road is much traveled. We met several hands of men bound for Okechoc among them was Mr. Pickett, ex-editor of the Albany Journal. He had just crossed a ford, and was reloading the wagon, sweating and tagging and anatomizing. He had been compelled to get out in the middle of the stream, in his bare feet, on the sharp stones, in the ice-cold water; and he was not in the best humor imaginable. Nevertheless, he furnished us with late papers, and inquired all about the road ahead, and when we inquired of him if he had seen anything of a powder-bag lying on the road, which he had lost, he replied that he had not "seen a flask of powder nor an other kind out there—he wished he could!" The Company intend working the road, and putting it in good order as soon as possible. But with careful and judicious driving it is even now safe and passable. Those who visit the Cascade mountains must not expect to see roads over them like that between Albany and Lebanon. They should expect to meet with rocks, and large rocks of tremendously large trees running across the road in some places; and to pass along where on one side of the road is a high perpendicular cliff, and on the other a deep canyon or abyss yawning below them. We would not give a farthing for a road over a mountain that does not have some difficult and ugly places in it.

RETURNED.—We returned late last Wednesday evening from a trip to the Cascade mountains, having been absent just ten days, with our health very materially improved. Four-fifths of the time we were out rained; yet the entire party, consisting of myself and A. Hackleman and our wives—were much benefited by the trip. We are too late this week, and we find the paper too much advanced to permit us to say to-day what we intend saying relative to the excursion. We have abundant material for a long article; but inasmuch as much of it is of a personal character, we have doubts as to the propriety of going very largely into detail. If we could only be assured that the reader would enjoy it as much as we did we would fill a page or more of the Democrat.

A YOUNG "MANHOOD" RECONSTRUCTED.—Mr. J. E. Bentley, of this city, while coming home from camp-meeting last Sunday, was saluted with some rather insulting and impertinent remarks from a well-known little nigger boy of Albany named "George"—whereupon Mr. B.
