ARRESTED FOR MURDER.—Dr. J. W. McAfce and wife, of Salem, were arrested at Hillsboro on Saturday last, by the Deputy Sheriff of Marion county, on charge of foul play towards the Doctor's first wife, who died suddenly at Salem about six months ago. At the time of the death of this lady, the Doctor was a member of the Medical Faculty of the Willamette University, who expressed some surprise at her sudden demise and proposed a post mortem examination. McAfce alleged the cause to be a softening of the brain. The brain was examined, but no sign of the disease alleged was discovered. The subject, however, was hushed up for a time, and in about six weeks the doctor married the widow of a Mr. Green, of the firm of Plamondon and Green, of Salem, who had died but a short time previous, and who had been under the treatment of McAfce. Recently new facts have come to light which have aroused suspicion sufficient to cause the arrest of both parties, who were taken back to Salem yesterday to answer the charge above stated. They were brought to this city on Saturday night last and looked in the County Jail until yesterday morning, when the officer proceeded with them to Salem. There had been some domestic trouble between the Doctor and his first wife prior to her death, which makes the case look worse. Prior to this trouble the Doctor had maintained a very respectable standing in the community. The trial of the case will elicit much interest among those that know the parties.—Portland Herald.

FROM WARM SPRING.—Mr. Gillingham, but recently clerk at the Warm Spring Agency, paid us a visit yesterday. He reports the weather as having been very fine at that place this winter. When he left plowing had been commenced.—Things at Ochoee were in a prosperous condition. There are about 80 settlers in that Valley at this time, among which there are twelve or fifteen families. Picket, of the Albany Journal, is now clerk at the Warm Spring Agency.
