

NEW YORK, Aug. 14.—A company of U. S. artillery is on duty in the U. S. District Court room, fully equipped, each man having ten rounds of ball cartridges. They were furnished at the request of Marshal Barlow, who, under an order from President Grant, intends to hold the prisoner, Pratt, in spite of the State Court, and protect himself from arrest.

Settlement of the Railroad Difficulty. BINGHAMPTON, Aug. 12.—Gen. McQuade, Gov. Hoffman's Superintendent of the Albany & Susquehanna Railroad, arrived this morning from Albany and took possession of the road. On the way from Harpersville to the tunnel, seven miles, Gen. McQuade found it necessary to ride on a carriage, the rails having been taken up from their position. The military have been withdrawn. The war is quiet, ended, but it is impossible to open the road for travel under two or three days.

Officers Removed. JACKSON, Aug. 12.—Judge J. efforts of the Supreme Court, A. Warren, Secretary of State and Judge Speed of the Criminal Court of Warren county, all prominent in the conservative movement in this State, with a large number of minor officers were removed to-day by General Ames.

Retrenchment Committee Coming. The Congressional Committee of Retrenchment, together with Senator Morrill and Cattell, of Finance Committee, and D. F. Murphy, of the Senate, are reported to have left last night for San Francisco. Several ladies will accompany the party.

Judge McCann has adjourned the proceedings in the Pratt case, to await the action of the U. S. Commissioner. By this action the danger of a collision will be avoided. The soldiers still remain in the U. S. Court room.

That Railroad Case. ALBANY, Aug. 13.—The hearing of an order by Judge Perham on what is known as the Omnibus Complaint, made by the Albany and Susquehanna Railroad to-day, by agreement of counsel, was postponed to August 30th. Judge Perham granted the order, which was excepted to by the counsel of the Erie party, continuing the injunction and staying the proceedings under Judge Barnard's order. A motion was made to set aside the order of Judge Barnard for a hearing at the special term in his district, which order, appointing Pruyn receiver, should not be vacated.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 13.—The War and Navy Departments have transferred to the Treasury the power to contract for the recovery of all vessels, whether Federal or rebel, sunk during the late rebellion.

Riot in Virginia. Information has been received here that on Wednesday last a difficulty occurred at Heathsville, Northumberland county, Virginia, between some white and colored persons, during the progress of which one of the latter was killed and several wounded. The riot is suppressed.

Senatorial Contest in Tennessee. NASHVILLE, Aug. 13.—The election of a United States Senator is exciting general interest. Ridge and Johnson are the most prominent prospective candidates, though Cooper has some supporters. The Banner will strongly oppose Johnson.

MEMPHIS, Aug. 13.—The cotton prospects are less favorable. It is calculated that the yield will not be larger in this vicinity than it was last year.

RICHMOND, Aug. 14.—Gen. Canby has sent a detachment of troops to Heathsville where the riot occurred between the blacks and whites.

CHICAGO, Aug. 14.—In the case of Pratt, the rioter, it is believed the Secretary of War will sustain the United States Commissioner and insist that he shall conclude the trial and not be prevented by the State Courts.

From Cuba. HAVANNA, Aug. 13.—Count Valmades captured near Ramonesque, a rebel convoy, Gen. Jordou commanding, which was moving towards Holquin. The rebels, after a short fight, took to flight. The commander escaped. This is considered the most important capture of the war.

The authorities of Santo Espiritu report a rebel plot to poison the bread used by the inhabitants on a certain day. It was discovered, and a number of suspected parties have been arrested.

Advices report that the Captain General has sent the ironclad Victoria to Demara to attempt the capture of the Peruvian monitors.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 12.—Cuban advices are to the 9th inst. General Jordan had commenced active preparations for a campaign. Several points on the coast are in possession of the Cubans, with power to hold them against any land force that can be brought against them. The Cuban leaders state that if belligerent rights are granted them by the United States the effect in Cuba will be such that in less than thirty days they will have possession of the entire island outside of Havana. They claim that the Cubans all sympathize with Céspedes' government and that the disaffection of

the Spanish troops would leave the Spanish government without an army. It is reported that there are serious difficulties among the volunteers and that many in the interior are joining the Republicans. The Spanish troops are represented as demoralized in condition and to be beyond the control of the officers. Everything is favorable to the Cuban cause.
