BY TELEGRAPH. MEMPHIS, Oct. 23.—A horrible murder took place near Purdy, Mississippi, on Saturday. Gilbert Combs shot and killed his brother, who was defending their mother against Gilbert. The affair grew out of the distribution of property left by their father. The murderer fled and has not been arrested.

PENNSYLVANIA ELECTION RETURNS.

PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 19.—The full official vote of Pennsylvania gives Gentry a majority of 4,592, and Williams, Judge of the Supreme Court, 8,703.

CHICAGO, Oct. 21.—Additional returns show the Radical majority in Iowa to be 33,636. Counties yet to hear from will increase it 3,000.

CALIFORNIA LEGISLATURE.—It appears that of the new Senators 15 are Democrats, 3 Republicans, and 2 Independent. The hold-over Senators stand 12 Democratic to 8 Republican; giving the Democrats 27 Senators altogether; or a majority of 14—which can be increased, as the Bulletin correctly remarks, to 16 of the Independent Senators, who are Tompkins, of Alameda, and Wilson, of Los Angeles, should vote with them on political issues. Of the 80 Assemblymen, 66 are Democrats, 11 Republican, and 3 Independent; giving the Democrats a certain majority of 52, and making their majority on joint ballot 59.
