I have just returned from an extended tour through the Southern States. I was in Kentucky, Tennessee, Alabama, Georgia and South Carolina, and had the fullest opportunity of making observations of affairs there and conversing with representative gentlemen of those States upon the subject of national political affairs.

NEWS OF THE WEEK.

Cleaned from the Telegraph.

Thursday, June 13. About 2,500 prominent Democrats, representing Virginia, Texas, Indiana, Kentucky, Illinois, Arkansas and New York held a meeting last night at Washington, and resolved that in the event of the Baltimore Convention endorsing the Cincinnati nominees, they would take steps to call another Convention and put a ticket for President and Vice-President in the field.

They have established headquarters at Indianapolis. Colonel Gray is Chairman. All the members of the Cabinet are absent from Washington, except Robison, Delano and Cresswell. The Democratic State Convention of Kansas yesterday unanimously endorsed Greeley and Brown.

The Democratic State Convention of Delaware, met to-day and passed resolutions bitterly denouncing Grant, declaring the Thirteenth, Fourteenth and Fifteenth Amendments to the Constitution frauds upon the people, and calling for a straight Democratic ticket.

The Conservative Central committee of Tennessee, to-day appointed delegations to the Baltimore Convention, a majority of whom pledged themselves to favor the acceptance of the Cincinnati nominee, but will abide the action of the Baltimore Convention.

At the Democratic State Convention of Indiana, last week, Hon. Thos. A. Hendricks was nominated for Governor by acclamation, amid the wildest applause. Friday, June 14. Rev. Dr. Huston, of Baltimore, has been indicted for adultery.

Vermont Democratic State Convention endorsed Greeley unanimously. South Carolina Democratic Convention endorsed Greeley. Massachusetts Convention did the same. Last night Deputy Sheriff Wm. Hatfield of Pittsburg, was stabbed and killed by Ambros Lynch, who alleges that he found Hatfield in bed with (Lynch's) sister, and that he stabbed him while in the bed. The woman denies this and says the Sheriff was in her house on business relative to her husband, who left the city to avoid prosecution for some offence. The Justits are to be expelled from Germany.

Saturday, June 15. A New York Frenchman yesterday shot his wife dead because she would not live with him any longer. She refused to live with him because he was disgraced by small-pox. Miss Tennie C. Clafin, sister to Victoria Woodhull, is elected Colonel of the N. Y. 5th Regiment. President Grant thinks it an even chance whether the Baltimore Convention will nominate Greeley, but hopes it will in order that the fight may be an open one between the two.

The Wisconsin Democratic State Convention has endorsed Greeley. A falling smoke-stack at Philadelphia yesterday killed 15 people. Following is the Democratic ticket of Indiana: Thos. A. Hendricks, for Governor, M. C. Kerr and John S. Williams, for Congress at large, Wm. M. Eddy for Secy of State, M. B. Hopkins, Superintendent of Public Instruction, E. J. Price, Clerk Supreme Court. The Convention passed resolutions endorsing the Cincinnati Platform.

Two women and two men were killed by a thunder storm, in Massachusetts yesterday. Bombay telegrams contain information from Arab sources that Livingstone is at Ujiji and is coming to the coast with Livingstone. From letters it appears that Livingstone had traversed the north end of Lake Ramganyana, on the way from Moniyya to Ujiji, where obtaining stores he returned to Ujiji. He refuses to leave the country, intending to explore an underground path between Lake Ujiji and Nyassa.

The world's fair is in session at Copenhagen, Denmark. The fanning in Persia is worse than ever. The suffering among the people is frightful. Sunday, June 16. Five thousand mechanics are on a strike in New York city. The steamship Robin, with the German Imperial Band and Cornet Quartette of Emperor William of Germany, with Herr Strauss, Madame Pischas and Leutner on board, arrived at New York this evening. The wife and daughter of Horace Greeley were also passengers on the Rhein. One hundred Iowa editors passed through Omaha yesterday on an excursion to Salt Lake City.

The State Temperance Convention of Pennsylvania, nominated a full ticket yesterday, with S. B. Chase for Governor. An Oswego dispatch says a curious phenomenon occurred late on Thursday—water alternately rising and falling two feet for sometime. There were other indications of a submarine earthquake. Geneva dispatches announce the arrival of all the members of the Board of Arbitration. The American Counsel and agent were closeted yesterday with Charles Francis Adams. It is reported in some quarters and contradicted in others that Count Schopalis is President of the Tribunal. He will propose an adjournment. Geneva is gallily decorated with flags. An absolute failure in arbitration is not apprehended by either side.

Monday, June 17. The internal revenue receipts for the past year are about twenty-five million. The N. Y. Evening Post says that the gentleman who is to meet at the Fifth Avenue Hotel to concert means of consolidation in opposition to Grant will not make their meeting or the ratification of the Cincinnati nominees. They say they have been made fools of once by others, and do not propose to repeat it now. The tribunal for the arbitration of Alabama claims met at Geneva, Switzerland, yesterday. All the members were present: Count Schlops, representing the King of Italy, President of the Court; Charles Francis Adams, arbitrator for United States; Alexander Cockburn, representing Great Britain; and Baron Dittigub, Brazil.

Tuesday, June 18. Lon. Tyler fatally stabbed J. Schu-

maker, in St. Louis, yesterday. Whisky. The murderer of Ex-Secretary of State Thule, at Springfield, Ills., about a year ago, has just been arrested. Boston is filling up for the great Peace jubilee. Small-pox spreading in the East. By the explosion of a steamer at Mersailles, France, yesterday, 44 passengers and 11 of the officers and crew were killed.

Wednesday, June 19. The great Peace Jubilee opened in Boston yesterday. Rev. E. J. Thompson, a Methodist preacher, was yesterday out to pieces with a hatchet, at Cincinnati, by a young man named Bauer, whose sweetheart Thompson is said to have kissed on leaving her father's house, where he had been visiting. Served him right. Preachers have no right fooling around other people's girls, anyhow.

A train ran off the track at Ford City, Ills., yesterday, killing 7 men. At the Boston Peace Jubilee yesterday the first performance was "Old Hundred" by a full chorus of sixteen thousand voices, orchestra of fifteen hundred pieces and grand organ.

A GROUP.—Geo. H. Williams made a speech at Salem the other day, and in alluding to the delegation from Jackson county in the House of Representatives at the last session, used the following language: "Look at your Jackson county representation. One of them (Jack Burnett) filed on 90,000 acres of swamp land; one (Joe Wells) is a murderer, and one (Jackson Rader) is dead and gone I know not where." The allusion to Jack Rader could only come from a heart lost to all feeling of humanity and calloused to every sentiment of goodness. Mr. Rader was a man of noble feeling, thought and attributes of manhood, was far above Geo. H. Williams as the heavens are above the earth. He was one of God's noblest works—an honest man. Williams is not. That's the difference between them. Williams has earned for himself lasting infamy by his contemptuous allusion to the good and honest man who sleeps in his lonely grave on the banks of the Willamette, and when the dread hour of death shall come upon him, Geo. H. Williams will ardently wish that he possessed the spotless soul and Christian record which Jackson Rader presented at the Bar of God—and will wish in vain.—Jacksonville Times.

PASSING THEM AROUND.—We are informed that the men employed on the railroad in Douglas and Lane counties are to be sent to Washington Territory. The election there comes off next fall, so they can do good service as voters for the Republican party. Those mercenary hounds are very handy fellows. Last fall they carried Oregon, and now they are to be driven over the Columbia to carry Washington Territory.
