The elephant Romeo, belonging to Forepaugh's Menagerie, now on exhibition in this city, has suffered from diseased feet for a long time, caused by large, heavy chains and rough treatment used in breaking him in, or subduing him from his fits of rage. On account of his feet being so bad, he has been with the show but very little this season. He was brought to this city on Friday morning last, three days in advance of the menagerie, as it was evident to Mr. Forepaugh that something had to be done or he would lose old Romeo. Upon inquiry Mr. Forepaugh learned that Dr. H. W. Boyd, Professor of Anatomy in the Chicago Medical College, had mounted several elephant skeletons, and knew all about elephants and other animals; also that he was an accomplished surgeon. Dr. Boyd's services were therefore engaged, his conditions being that the elephant should be so secured that he would not injure him, which was agreed to by his owner. Yesterday morning at nine o'clock Dr. Boyd, assisted by Dr. R. J. Withers, veterinary surgeon to the City Railway stables, proceeded to examine the diseased portions. They decided the first was first secured with chains, the second with a screw, and the third with a screw, and they proceeded to lay the bones bare by large incisions. The hemorrhage was very profuse, at least one bucketful of blood escaping from the one foot. They soon reached the bone, and gonged and chiseled away until all the dead portions were removed. Then, with white hot irons, the proud flesh was all burned out, and the bleeding arrested. The foot was then dressed with carbolic acid and glycerine. Old Romeo seemed to know that something was being done for his relief. He groaned and snorted most pitifully, but it was of no use—he was held for three long hours, until the operation was brought to a successful conclusion. The surgical operation detailed above did not avail to save the life of the poor beast, for he has since died. They tell a story about a girl who wished to rid herself of a persistent lover. So, when he used to come around in the evening, she would ask him if he wouldn't please help John to carry the piano up stairs, and he would take off his coat and work like a brigade of Irishmen until it was time to go home.
