FUNERAL OF N. H. CRANOR.—Last Tuesday was a general day of mourning in Albany, our citizens being engaged as a unit in paying the last tribute of respect to the remains of the lamented N. H. Cranor. On Monday evening the legal fraternity of the city held a meeting at the Court House, at which J. C. Powell, Esq., presided and S. A. Johns, Esq., acted as Secretary, and resolved to attend the funeral in a body. They also appointed a committee to draft resolutions of respect to be reported at a subsequent meeting. On the same evening the Mayor convened a special meeting of the Common Council, the proceedings of which will be found elsewhere in this paper. Other societies held meetings at the same time, and at the hour appointed for the funeral on Tuesday there was formed the largest procession which has attended the remains of the lamented Delazon Smith—ever witnessed in Albany. The order of the procession was as follows: 1st, the cofined remains of deceased; 2d, the mourners and relatives; 3d, His Honor Judge Bonham and members of the Albany bar; 4th, the Mayor and Common Council; 5th, Albany Fire Company; 6th, citizens— all escorted by Albany Lodge No. 4, L. O. O. F., who conducted the funeral arrangements and performed the rites of burial. The vast assemblage crowded the Court House to its fullest capacity, to listen to the able and appropriate discourse delivered by Rev. Dr. Geary. Agreeably to the order of the Common Council, every business house in the city was closed during the hours occupied in the funeral rites, and a solemn sadness pervaded the entire community. All seemed to feel that Mr. Cranor's death was a public calamity, and all felt like sharing in the griefs of his mourning family.

NEW CITY HALL.—Our energetic fellow citizen, David Froman, is determined that Albany shall not long be without a public hall, and has already let the contract for building one on Second street, between Ferry and Broadblair, just east of Cannon's stable. The hall is to be built of wood 40 feet wide, 80 feet long, and 16 feet from floor to ceiling. Mr. Froman designs procuring a supply of roller skates and turning the hall into a skating rink for at least a time, at least it will be arranged so as to be used for theaters, shows, balls, etc., at any time when required. This is an institution which our city has long needed and is one which will doubtless pay a handsome dividend on the money invested in its erection.

ALBANY COLLEGIATE INSTITUTE.

It was our pleasure to spend last Friday afternoon in visiting Albany Collegiate Institute and 'interviewing' its several apartments. President Warren exerts himself to the fullest to give his visitors a complete insight into the conduct of the institution, as well as to observe the efficiency of the students. The winter term was inaugurated last week with something over one hundred students, which is a gratifying evidence of the institution's popularity as well as of its prosperity. President Warren's discipline is thorough, yet not severe, and his able faculty seems to fully partake of the admirable spirit which he has infused into the school, of inciting the students to excel rather by stimulating their ambition than by severity of commands. We doubt if any other educational institution in the State has a more correct, careful and able corps of instructors than is combined in the faculty of Albany Collegiate Institute, composed of President Warren, Prof. Sox and Miss. Louisa Simpson. This institution has three well organized literary societies, two of whom have tastefully furnished meeting rooms which are a credit and a source of pride to our city. Soft yielding carpets of beautiful figure cover the floors, comfortable chairs and cosy lounge are conveniently arranged throughout the rooms, symmetrical marble-top tables of neat design add grace and elegance to the apartments, while various other ornaments and furnishings go to make up a resort at once inviting and luxurious. The Sigma Phi (or young gentlemen's) Society has much the largest and probably at present the most completely furnished of the two rooms; but the Epsilon Phi (or young ladies') Society must in the very nature of things eventually eclipse the other in tasteful furnishing and elegance of arrangements. However, this is no disparagement to the boys, as they have done much in fitting up, at great expense, such neat, pleasant and inviting quarters. We enjoyed the pleasure of visiting the Epsilon Phi's meeting last Friday and of witnessing their exercises, and were agreeably surprised at the admirable order, parliamentary behavior and superior culture displayed by the members of that institution. Miss Libbie Halbrook, the President, presides with much grace and dignity, and the young ladies of the society are all 'well up' in parliamentary usage and etiquette. We tender the Society our thanks for courtesies extended to us during our visit.

FIRE.—The residence of Perry Watson, of Marion county, was consumed by fire last Monday, with nearly all of the furniture and the family's clothing. The Statesman says the youngest child, a babe, was rescued from its bed after the ceiling of the bedroom had fallen upon the foot of the bed, and the bed clothes were in a blaze. Mr. Watson lost all his papers. The loss is estimated to be between \$2,500 and \$3,000, on which there was an insurance for \$1,800 in the Phoenix Insurance Co. Mr. Watson was for many years a citizen of Albany, and many who knew him here will regret his loss.
