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THE VERY LATEST NEWS.
Foreign papers contain reports from Gibraltar, announcing the total loss of the steamer *Arcturion*, of Newcastle, England. One man only saved out of a crew of twenty-three.

Calif. Cushing succeeds Dan Sickles as Minister to Spain.

The Havana Circuit Court has condemned the steamer *Virginia* as a lawful prize.

Another steamer from Santiago de Cuba arrived on the 26th, bringing the intelligence that Ralph Hooper, the missing correspondent of the *New York Tribune*, is supposed to have fallen overboard from the steamer *Cienfuegos* on her last trip.

A Washington special says the Oregon opponents of the continuation of Williams are renewing their efforts during recess. They have not as yet filed any additional charges, but declare that his rejection is certain. There is but little doubt that he will retire from the Cabinet in the event of his rejection.

A Havana dispatch of the 28th says: The intrigues of the 16th instant ordered Principe, destroying everything within his reach. They met with a repulse before Fort Diamont, and in a subsequent attack on a detachment of the Civil Guards lost several in killed. Latest reports say they are now in full retreat, pursued by Spanish troops.

This is the way the Washington correspondent of the *Brooklyn Argus* states it: "It pleased the Executive mind to make Mr. and Mrs. Williams the candidate for the Chief Justiceship at once. Let not any unscrupulous soul suppose that the Judge would be anywhere even on the Supreme Bench, without his compliance. Mrs. W. says 'we' when she mentions the Cabinet. Therefore on the Supreme Bench still, 'we' let it be."
