

"WE TOLD YOU SO!"

The Oregonian in its "astonishment" over the result in Linn county, says that the Greenback movement, instead of helping the Republicans, as was expected, assisted the Democrats. This is a mistake, for a Halsey and Harrisburg, where the Republicans were largely pledged to the Greenback cause, the vote shows about the usual Republican vote—in fact, at Halsey, where it was claimed before the election that there was something over a hundred Greenback votes, two-thirds of whom were Republicans, the result of the election shows the usual Republican majority and a reduced Democratic vote, while in Santiam precinct—the Democrats are strong hold of the Greenback—the vote shows that every man asked to vote and voted the ticket. Another instance of where the Greenback movement helped the Republicans is shown plainly at Harrisburg, where the Republican candidate for State Treasurer received nearly the entire Greenback vote, and their candidate for County Sheriff received all of it—some 80 odd.

It is self-evident that the Republican Greenbackers played their old "snipe game" on their Democratic allies, else we would have elected every county officer and given the entire State ticket four hundred majority.

We trust now that our Democratic Greenback friends will forever abandon this miserable farce and return to the gallant old party which shows such an invulnerable front against all opposing parties.

THE NEXT LEGISLATURE.

It is now reported that the Independents of Baker and Jackson counties have elected the Legislative tickets in their respective counties, yet this does not change the complexion of the Legislature. The Democrats have elected members to the Lower House as follows:

Baker 1, Benton 2, Douglas 4, Jackson 1, Josephine 1, Lane 4, Linn 6, Marion 1, Polk 2, Wasco 2, Washington 2, Yamhill 2; total 27. We shall undoubtedly elect in Grant 1, Lake 1, Umatilla 2, Union 2, making a total of 33 in the Lower House. The Democrats may also elect the member from Coos and Curry. The Senate will stand 17 Democratic to 13 Republican, giving a majority on joint ballot of 10.

BIRNEY'S DEFEAT.

As proof of the charge we made against Mr. Hurley in the campaign, we refer to the vote of Yamhill county, which, though giving a Republican majority, went back on him by 150!

And Judge Whitney's election in a District which is unquestionably Republican by from 200 to 300, is the strongest evidence of that gentleman's popularity.

Good-bye Hurley! Hurrah for Whitney!

STATE TICKET IN DOUBT.

Up to the hour of going to press the State ticket is still in doubt, with chances in favor of the Republicans on most of the candidates. The returns from Lake, Coos and the Eastern Oregon counties are not yet reported, but with estimates based upon the past record of those counties it is most probable that Taylor is elected over Beckman by a small majority, and we may possibly have secured Stites' election also.

HOW LINN ANTONISHED THEM.

In its gloomy comments of the result of the election in the State the Oregonian says: "Linn county gives an astonishing majority for the Democratic candidates."

Should say so, Bro. Scott! What do you suppose the Democracy of Linn are here for but to scotch your Radicalism away from you (p. 1) your heads up! Give us something hard to do.

TO BE REGRETTED.

It is very much to be regretted that Mr. Philip Grigley, our Democratic candidate for County Treasurer, is defeated. LATEST LAST NIGHT.

Dispatches last night state that Union county has gone 50 to 50 Democrat, Umatilla 39 for Whiteaker and Brown, and the entire Democratic county ticket by small majorities. Coos county gives an average Republican majority of 75.

OUR STATE SENATORS.

W. R. Hedges' vote in the county is 1,357; J. H. Smith's is 1,333; Piper is 1,230; Powell's is 1,087. Bilesen's majority over Piper is 257, and over Powell 270. Smith's majority over Piper is 213, and over Powell 215.

The Democrats of Marion elected their County Judge and one Representative. This is better than the Republicans of Linn did.

STATE ELECTION RETURNS. Weston, Ogn.—At 3 P. M. a very heavy vote had been polled, with Pillington, Independent candidate for Senator ahead. Berry, Independent, and Whit, Democratic, were each running ahead of their ticket for Representative, up to 4 o'clock 300 votes had been cast, but owing to indiscriminate scratching nothing definite is known. The Independents claim the precinct for a majority of their ticket.
