Council Proceedings. City Council met in regular session on Tuesday evening, at 7 o'clock. Present—D. Froman, Mayor; N. J. Heaton, Recorder; A. J. Hunt, Marshal; Danna, Pearce, Blackburn, Grauhohl and Saltmarsh, Councilmen.

Committee on Health and Police reported on petition in regard to the removal of Siletz Indians, recommending that the Mayor write to the agent, requesting him to recall them to the reservation.

Committee on Streets and Public Property recommended the granting of petition of Masons for sidewalk to the cemetery, with the following changes: instead of four stringers there be but three, said stringers to be 2 1/2 inches.

Committee on Accounts and Current Expenses reported the following bills correct, and they were allowed: A. J. Hunt, work, etc., \$12.65; costs in case of Crabbe, \$6.55; A. J. Hunt, work and material, \$21.13; P. W. Spinks, wood, \$4.50.

The following bills from the Fire Department were presented, and their payment being recommended by the Chief Engineer were ordered paid: Huston & Roberts, repairs, \$3; Maxx Stocker, painting, \$5.

On motion of Councilman Gradwohl, the Marshal was ordered to put sufficient gravel on First street, between Thurston and Lafayette, and on Third between Lyon and Baker streets, to make a good and passable road.

On motion of Councilman Saltmarsh, the Marshal was instructed to put whatever gravel was necessary around the cistern at the junction of Lyon and Baker streets.
