

ROAST GROUSE.—To roast grouse clear them carefully, put a large piece of the best butter inside each bird, and roast in the oven half an hour or more, basting with butter.

DELICIOUS GRAHAM MUFFINS.—Add two beaten eggs to one pint of milk; stir in two cups of Graham flour and one teaspoonful of baking powder. Bake in quick oven fifteen minutes. These are made very quickly.

STEAMED OYSTERS.—Drain some select oysters; put in a pan, and place in a steamer over boiling water; steam until the oysters begin to curl, and then serve on a hot dish, with butter, salt and pepper; garnish with chopped pickles.

SLUGS AND PLANTS.—Slugs are occasionally seen eating large holes or notches in the leaves of all succulents and bergoniads. They usually feed during the night. Cut potatoes, turnips or some other fleshy vegetable, in halves, and place conveniently near the plants. The slugs will gather on the vegetable and are easily destroyed.

BEEF AU GRATIN.—Take cold beef, either boiled or roasted, and cut it in thin slices. Grate a tin pan with butter, dust with bread crumbs, put in a little chopped parsley, and lay on the slices of beef. Put salt, pepper and parsley on top, dust with bread crumbs, drop on lemon juice and a little broth just to cover the bottom of the pan, and place it in the oven.

HOG SCRAPING MACHINE.—A hog scraping-machine which has just been tested in Chicago, worked satisfactorily. A hog was killed, placed in the machine, almost in an instant came out with only a few odd hairs on his head and legs. Seven hogs were passed through the machine in fifty-seven seconds, and each came out as hairless as could be desired. With a few improvements the machine is expected to finish 6,000 hogs in ten hours.

ARTIFICIAL MANURE.—It is found in England that many of the artificial manures act chiefly as a stimulant, and that after a time the land refuses to answer the spur. This is most apparent on the poor and lighter soils, but even strong land loses heart unless a fair proportion of farm yard manure is applied. The latest agricultural complaints in Great Britain are from a district where scientific farming has been carried to its highest pitch, such as the Lothians and in Norfolk.

WHEAT AND BEER.—Of all the crops grown by the farmer, wheat contains the largest portion of dry or solid matter, namely, from 80 to 90 per cent. Animals (live weight) contain but 25 per cent. of dry matter. If the nitrogen or valuable part of the meal and what is considered to all have come from the soil—and the latest and most weighty evidence upon this point is that the soil, rather than the atmosphere, is the chief source of nitrogen, the removal of a ton of wheat from the soil will not exhaust the land as the growing of a ton of corn.

ROAST GOOSE.—Stuff the goose with a potato dressing made in the following manner: six potatoes, boiled, pared and mashed fine and light; one table-spoonful of salt, one tea-spoonful of pepper, one spoonful of sage, two table-spoonfuls of onion juice, two of butter. Truss and dredge well with salt, pepper and flour; roast before the fire—if weighing eight pounds one hour and a half; in the oven one hour and a quarter. Make gravy the same as for turkey. No butter is required for goose, it is so fat. Serve with apple sauce. Many people boil the goose half an hour before roasting, to take away the flavor.

COLD SLAW.—With a sharp knife—there are knives made for the express purpose—cut up nicely a firm head of cabbage, sprinkle it with as much pepper and salt as you think necessary; beat up the yolk of one egg, add a lump of butter the size of a walnut, a gill of cream, the same quantity of vinegar, table-spoonful of sugar, an even tea-spoonful of mustard and a pinch of bruised celery seed; heat these condiments, mixed together, in a tin cup; put the slaw in an oven, and stir the mixture over it, boiling hot, stir it well mixed and the cabbage slightly cooled, then send to the table hot.

HOW TO KEEP BUTTER.—It is the easiest thing in the world. Simply put it in clean jars and cover with a strong brine. This will keep your butter a year, fresh and sweet, as we know by experience. It is almost equally as good to put in oak casks headed tight. This is equivalent to canning fruit. The brine in case of the jar acts as a heating, keeping the air out. But butter should be made poor; we never experimented on poor butter. Work out the butter milk until you have only pure butts, clear as rain-water; but do not work so much as to break the grain, in which case you have a tough, heavy article in wicker and grease in one. Such butter we advise no one to try to preserve.
