One of the first Bishers of our Church in this country writing as early as 1807 proceeds as follows.

Let it be noted that the distinction, and subordination of the offices of these three grades of the ministry is to be inferred not from their names, but from their practices, from the powers vested in them, end from their acts of jurisdiction. Desperate indeed must be the cause of the opponents of Episcopacy, when they insist that the grades of ministers now distinguished as Bishops and Presbyters possessed originally the same powers applied to the same order.
