Hoof and horn shavings contain more than twenty-five times as much nitrogen as is contained in average stable manure.

Sheep fed on dry feed are frequently troubled with sore lips. An application of sulphur and lard once or twice will generally effect a cure.

Cork trees are being successfully raised in Georgia. The cork on some specimens planted there is already thick enough for use.

It requires about 5000 young fish to stock a pond of one acre in extent. Of fish weighing from one to two pounds 1000 to the acre is a liberal estimate.

Potato flour, or the dried pulp of the potato, is attaining great importance in the arts. It is stated that in Lancashire, England, 20,000 tons of it are sold annually.

It is estimated that with abundant fodder, a medium-sized animal will produce in a year the following amounts of manure: Horse, exclusive of less during work, nine tons; ox or cow, ten to twelve tons; sheep (October to May) three-quarters of a ton, and a hog one and a quarter to two tons.

Many a dairyman practices milking their cows steadily without allowing their animals to go dry. They feed heavily on corn meal and oil cake until the milk falls, when the cow is replaced by a fresh one.
