STAND BY THE TICKET.

J. J. Charlton presented to the County Court of Linn County at the June term, 1881, a claim for percentage on all taxes collected by him from Jan. 22nd, 1881, to April 6th, 1881. The claim amounted to about \$500. Mr. Charlton, while collecting these taxes was acting under the new law passed in 1880, and during this time drew his salary under this new law, but after he had collected these taxes and after he had received his salary, Mr. Charlton concluded that he would obtain additional compensation for his services by forcing the County Court to pay him, over and above the salary allowed by the new law, viz: \$2000 per annum, the percentage allowed by the old law on all taxes collected by him. The following was copy from the record of Linn County, vol. 6, pages 323 and 324:

COUNTY COURT Linn County, Oregon.
June 9th inst., 1881.
J. J. Charlton vs. Linn County—Bill for percentage on taxes for the year 1880 collected in Linn County, Oregon, from Jan. 22nd, 1881, to April 6th, 1881.

Now at this day this cause came to be heard. * * * And after argument by counsel the court finds from the claim itself and from the record of this court as matter of fact: That said J. J. Charlton performed the services mentioned. That between the 22nd day of Jan. 1881, and the 19th day of May, 1881, said J. J. Charlton claimed of said County of Linn a salary of \$2000 per annum exclusive of mileage for his services as such Sheriff. That said claim of said J. J. Charlton was allowed and ordered paid by this Court and that said J. J. Charlton accepted and received said salary as full compensation for his services as such Sheriff under the act of the Legislative Assembly of the State of Oregon, providing for the compensation of Sheriff and Clerk of the Counties of Linn, Lane, etc., approved Oct. 25, 1880, and that said J. J. Charlton has not returned or offered to return to said Linn County said salary nor any part thereof so received by him. That the claim of said J. J. Charlton is based on services rendered by him between the 22nd day of Jan., 1881, and the 19th day of May, 1881, during which time he accepted and received a salary for his services as Sheriff. As matter of law the Court finds: That in collecting the taxes of Linn County said J. J. Charlton acted as Sheriff of Linn County. That said J. J. Charlton having claimed, received and retained the said salary as such Sheriff, he is estopped from claiming and has waived any right he might have had to the percentage on which said claim is based. It is therefore ordered and adjudged by the Court that said claim be and is hereby disallowed and dismissed.

Now it appears from the record and finding of the County Court that Mr. Charlton undertook to draw and receive pay for his services under both the law of 1880 and the old law repealed by the new. We have no comments to make, no insinuations as to his motives. Mr. Charlton was so determined in this matter that he immediately appealed from this judgment or finding of the County Court but Judge Boise sustained fully, the above finding of the County Court, after which Mr. Charlton immediately appealed from Judge Boise's finding to the Supreme Court of this State. The Supreme Court sustained the judgment and finding of Judge Boise, as well as the above finding of the County Court. While it is true that the county was successful in all this litigation against its Sheriff it is also true that the county was forced to employ and pay attorneys to appear and defend, both in the Circuit and Supreme Courts. The county was therefore forced to pay for this litigation forced upon it by the Sheriff something near \$150, and this money as paid out, who the taxpayers are compelled to raise from their hard earnings. Mr. Charlton two years ago promised that he would abide by whatever the legislature saw proper to do in regard to the fees of Sheriff in this county. We submit to the honest voters and taxpayers of Linn whether or not he has acted in good faith. We give you the record of the County Court for your inspection and ask you to decide for yourselves on this matter. We do not desire to misrepresent any one, not even a candidate of the opposite party. Let the voters have the facts and judge for themselves. It is not for us to say that Mr. Charlton is guilty of double dealing or that he is dishonest or unfaithful to his trust. It is also claimed and asserted by those who claim to know that Sheriff Charlton contributed money for the purpose of helping to pay the attorneys who succeeded in upsetting the new law, fixing the salary of Clerks and Sheriffs in certain counties in this State. It is claimed that Mr. Charlton refused to put up any money before the law was defeated, but that after the law was defeated he contributed his portion.

Farmers and taxpayers look out for your own interests and vote for men that have been true to their pledges. Vote for the entire Democratic legislative ticket in order that you may have fees of officers reduced, and then votes for the Democratic County candidates for Sheriff, Clerk, Treasurer, Commissioners and all the rest. Senator Bilyeu saved you over \$30,000 on the asylum bill, Chamberlain reduced your interest from 12 to 10 per cent, Bilyeu reduced the compensation for your Clerk and Sheriff from \$6000 to \$1800 and \$2000. Passed the bill to tax mortgages passed other measures of great importance; Hoult is firm and

honest and capable. Dawson tried to raise Bruce's salary from \$900 to \$1200. Paul did nothing in your interest. Humphrey will not ask the county to pay him double compensation as Sheriff, Stewart will take what the law allows him, and Peery will not ask any member of the legislature to raise his salary. Democrats, vote the straight ticket, work for the whole ticket. Do not swap. Do not scratch. You have a good ticket and stand by it.

MALICIOUS CHARGES.

The advent of the *Herald* has marked an epoch in Republican journalism in Linn County. Prior to the Republican organ here, was honorable in its dealings with the public and truthful in its statements of facts. It would not intentionally and maliciously misrepresent any matter of public interest for partisan ends; nor would it seek by innuendoes to destroy a citizen known everywhere in the State to be the very soul of honor and integrity, when it had not the courage to make the charge directly. But the *Herald* has different methods. Witness its lying, insinuating and malicious assaults upon Senator Bilyeu. It is difficult to read them with patience or forbearance. Every well informed citizen of Linn County knows S. B. No. 43 did pass the Senate. The fact is susceptible of proof both by record and all the members of the legislative assembly of the last session. The Bill was sent to the House for its consideration by order of the President of the Senate. It was there read once, and could have been easily passed if Dawson had been present and insisted upon its passage. But as we have shown from the record, he abandoned his post of duty and this bill more important to the people than any other before the Legislature was lost, for which Dawson was and is mainly responsible. This dastardly scheme run by irresponsible hirelings, (Pottenger & Porter), one of whom is not a voter, never having sworn allegiance to this Government, undertakes to dictate to honest men how they shall cast their votes. These two gentlemen who do not own a dollar's worth of property in Linn County, who do not pay a dollar's tax in this State, are engaged in traducing the character of men who have been raised in our midst, and who are known to be honest and beyond reproach. Their attack upon Hon. W. R. Bilyeu is both malicious and corrupt and the insinuations made in that sheet are utterly and entirely false, and Mr. Porter the author thereof knew they were false when he wrote them, and he knowingly and willfully lied for the purpose of following out the instructions of his bosses. The *Herald* was prosecuted by one of the good citizens of Linn about one year ago for publishing a slanderous article on him and Hon. W. R. Bilyeu defended the slanderous sheet and by an able defense barely saved its editors from the punishment they deserved. We warn all honest citizens to look out for this irresponsible sheet. It will be full of corrupt and false statements in its last issue before the election, and its editors being wholly irresponsible, makes them dare to so falsify and knowingly traduce the names and characters of our citizens. Democrats, do not consult or read its false and wicked statements but vote and work for the whole ticket and let the voters crown your efforts. Do not allow these corrupt and malicious practices to triumph over truth and honesty. The Democrats have a good majority in Linn County and the whole Democratic ticket can and will be elected. Then let us rally as in days of yore and march in solid phalanx to the polls on June 5th and overwhelm the enemy in defeat. We desire to return to honest Democratic rule. Vote the entire ticket and victory, glorious victory is yours.

AN INFAMOUS PROPOSAL.

It is an evidence of weakness when the members of a party stoop to trickery and the lowest kind of wire pulling to elect a candidate. The best people regardless of politics will condemn the course taken by the leaders of the Republican party, and we are certain they will put a veto to it on the 5th of next June. Finding they can not by any possibility defeat Bilyeu they say, and we can prove they have said it, "Why not elect both Bilyeu and Dawson: You vote for Dawson and we will vote for Bilyeu," thus leaving Hoult and Wilson completely out; but on every hand the Democrats have manfully refused to enter into any such villainous arrangements, for they know not only that Mr. Hoult is head and shoulders above Dawson in every respect, but as well that they can elect both, and their whole ticket, by an overwhelming vote, and they are going to stand together to a man. The infamous proposal to which they are known to have made to Democrats to trade the candidate for County Clerk in almost any way to elect Davis is but another one of their low tricks, and we are glad to hear is treated with contempt by Democrats throughout the county. It is a terribly sad spectacle when the members of a party, driven to desperation, willing to grasp at any straw, openly consent to go back on any member on their ticket, whom they helped to put in nomination, for the purpose of electing any single candidate. Such conduct borders on to total depravity. It is possible the Republicans are becoming depraved.

OUR STATE TICKET.

The gratifying news comes to us from every part of the State that the Democratic State ticket will be elected. Every voter who looks to the future peace and prosperity of our country feels it to be his duty now to stop the encroachments upon the wage class of our own kind and forever put this question at rest. Hence Oregon will roll up a Democratic majority that she never gave before. This question of labor is the vital question for our people to consider and workmen in their shops, factories and tents have solemnly declared that they have rights and they must be respected and they know also that Democrats and their party have and do recognize and defend them. Frank Pixley in his masterly denunciation of the Republican party for betraying the white laborer says that the only hope of our coast is in the Democratic party. It is principle now and not men. It is our own people and not political schemers who desire by their party organization and money to keep themselves in office. It is the life's blood of the nation that we must preserve and vitalize it into healthful currents for the sustenance of those who generate it. Then all voters should make this occasion what every voter on this coast expects who is looking to the destruction of the Mongolian power that is growing up among us. Before the 10th of August next when the bill for the prevention of immigration of Chinese will go into effect, there will have arrived on this coast 40,000 Chinese and mostly in Oregon. Voters of Oregon are you to welcome them by a Republican victory in June next. All of our declarations against this class coming here will be taken as the silly utterances of the hypocrite if we now contradict it by a Republican victory. Let us have and show the pride and determination that should always surround the honest effort of self preservation.

REMEMBER MOODY.

We wish to say a few words to our readers in relation to Mr. Moody, the Republican candidate for Governor. While his private character may be all that any one could wish, we maintain that his views on most of the political questions which are of the greatest interest to the people of this valley are not such as will make him a particularly strong candidate in this section. If there were any two questions upon which the people of Linn county were united two years ago it was on the reduction of the fees of clerks and sheriffs, and the reduction of interest. When the Legislature convened Hon. Geo. E. Chamberlain introduced House Bill No. 6, reducing the rate of interest. It passed, but Moody, who was then Speaker of the House, voted against it. See House Journal, 1880, page 132.

At the same session Senator Bilyeu introduced Senate Bill No. 12, reducing fees of clerks and sheriffs. It passed the Senate after a hard fight, and when it came up in the House only seven voted against it, and one of them was Moody. See House Journal, 1880, page 239.

This fee bill has become inactive by reason of a Supreme Court decision, and will be introduced again in different shape at the next term of the Legislature, and an effort will also be made to change the usury law again. Moody was against the people on these questions two years ago, and it would be foolishness now to place him where the life of a bill of this kind would be in his hands.

"ATARTY CORNER."

Under the above caption the Albany *Herald* proceeds to deliberately and knowingly misstate the facts concerning the inquest held on the body of Henry Johnson. The *Herald* has a great deal to say about the tardiness of Dr. J. A. Davis, coroner, and insinuates that Dr. Davis, covering his own convenience etc., falsely asserted that the Coroner was notified about 4.30 p. m. of the death of Johnson, when in fact it was 5.15 p. m. The *Herald* also states that it was only five or six miles to where the tragedy occurred, when in fact it is about 10 miles. Now it is apparent that from the lateness of the hour and the distance that it would have been fully for Dr. Davis to have gone before the next morning. The *Herald* says that Dr. Davis did not arrive until half past nine o'clock. This is false as it was just 8.20 a. m. when he arrived at Mr. Adams' house where the body had been conveyed. Why does this Fog Horn shout persist in willfully lying upon the good citizens of this county? Does not the *Herald* man know that the Coroner is required to make a careful examination of all the facts and circumstances concerning the death of any party, examine the ground, &c. This Dr. Davis could not have done on that evening after traveling the distance of 10 miles. Mr. Grey, the brother-in-law of the deceased and Dr. Dodd were consulted by the Coroner in regard to this matter and advised the course taken by him. It seems that the *Herald* is determined to keep on slandering and vilifying our citizens until some one invokes the severest penalties of the criminal statute for their benefit. It is about time that such slanderous journalism be stopped. Dr. Davis has been a good and efficient officer and will be vindicated from these false charges by being re-elected on Monday next.

LOOK OUT FOR CANARDS.

From good authority we learn that the managers of the Republican party in this county expect to follow their old plan of making serious charges against the Democratic candidates in the last issue of the *Herald*, which will be published at such a late date as to prevent their contradiction. This is nothing but guerrilla warfare, and is unfair and unjust. They will take this course especially against Messrs. Bilyeu and Stewart. These gentlemen have both resided in this county for many years, and are so well known that campaign lies against them will be believed by very few. Democrats should look out for these lies and do their best to counteract their effect.

CORRECT IT.

The printer of the tally sheets for the coming election has the name of the Democratic candidate for State Treasurer incorrectly printed. In the tally sheets it is Hiram Abraham when it should be Hyman Abraham. Voters will see that their tickets have Hyman Abrahams upon them.

We see by our exchanges that Prof. Powell is trying to make political capital against Hon. W. D. Fenton on the ground that he was a law student of Senator Grover's. It is a rule in law that when a witness is proven false in one case he is false in all. Mr. Fenton never was a student of Senator Grover's, and Prof. Powell knows this as well as he knows that he tells an untruth when he asserts that the present State officers have reduced the State debt \$400,000. We rather sympathized with Prof. Powell in his defeat before the Republican Convention, but since that time he has shown himself such an unscrupulous political demagogue, we conclude the convention knew the man much better than we did, and he has proven by his acts that he is utterly unworthy of the position he has held. Mr. Fenton was a student under Mr. Rufus Mallory, who is now canvassing the State for Meedy in company with Sankey, his bosom friend of 1872.—Standard.

It is amusing to see how the editor of the *Herald* struggles to create dissatisfaction among the defeated candidates before the Democratic Convention. He has been doing his best to get Hon. T. L. Porter off the track, but he is wasting his thunder. Tom Porter is the true blue, and says that while he was defeated, it was done squarely and he will support the whole ticket with a will.

RUMORS were rife a few days ago that Hon. Jas. P. Schooling, of Harrisburg, was opposing a part of the Democratic ticket. This is entirely false. He is supporting the entire ticket and laboring for the success of the entire ticket, and wishes all his friends to do the same. Don't believe these Republican campaign lies; don't trade, and the whole ticket will be elected.

HON. E. MOULT has represented Linn county before in the Oregon legislature. He then acquitted himself honorably and with credit to the people who confided their interests to his keeping. He is among the oldest of our citizens and is fully identified with the interests of the people of this county. He will have over 300 majority.

The *Herald* man will find that his bitter attack, based on downright misrepresentation, made upon Hon. W. R. Bilyeu will only make him votes on the fifth of June. Linn county never had a more faithful representative and for that reason he will be selected to the Senate by a large majority.

Seward, late minister to China, in an article entitled "Mongolian Immigration," makes an argument against the proposed anti-Chinese legislation. Dr. John W. Dowling, Dean of the New York Homeopathic Medical College, comes to the defense of the Hahnemannian School of medicine, against a recent attack upon its principles and methods. O. B. Frothingham has a sympathetic article on Swedenborg. Not the least important paper in the issue is "Has Land a Value?" by Isaac L. Rice, it being a criticism of one of the fundamental postulates of Henry George's political economy. Finally, Charles F. Lydecker essays to prove that a "National Militia" is a constitutional impossibility.

ANOTHER FALSEHOOD.

ALBANY, May 30th, 1882.
Editor Democrat:
To the Albany *Herald* of the 18th inst, as your readers will remember, there appeared under the caption "Hon. W. R. Bilyeu's Senatorial Record" a lengthy editorial reflecting upon Mr. Bilyeu's course in regard to S. B. No. 43, alleging that said bill had been introduced in the name of its author, and insinuating that the corrupt influence of lobbyists had been brought to bear on Mr. Bilyeu. This article, as every intelligent citizen knows was a gross misrepresentation, not sustained by the records of the two houses, and called to the attention of the *Herald* by the journal of the house shows that the bill did pass the Senate and was reported to the house. Soon after my attention was called to the article in question, I had, on two several occasions, conversations with three gentlemen in regard to the article in question, and each time I said that the record would not bear the "Herald" out in its attack on Mr. Bilyeu, for I remembered distinctly that the bill was reported to the house toward the close of the session and that it was impossible to get it through the house out of the regular order. In one conversation, I remarked that an effort was made to take the bill up, and that Mr. Bilyeu was there urging the matter forward. These were the only conversations I ever had in relation to the matter prior to the 25th inst. On the last date the "Herald" in a second article under the same heading in a denial of abuse against Mr. Bilyeu and reflecting specially on (S. B. No. 43) and the time when it reached the house, quoting in connection therewith as saying that "S. B. No. 43" came at a time when in the hurry and bustle attending the closing hours of the Legislature it was impossible to get it through.

I am fully willing to say that the remark quoted was never given utterance to by me or was any conversation over had by me with anyone substantially differing from what I have first stated herein. I have seen the editor of the "Herald" in reference to the remark attributed to me, and he admits that I never had any such conversation with him, but that his article was a responsible citizen, and the three gentlemen with whom I conversed about the matter prior to the 25th inst., denying attributing to me the remarks quoted in the "Herald." I have no hesitancy in saying that any man who says he ever heard me make the remark quoted at all, or anything that could possibly be twisted into the remarks attributed to me and the connection in which it is used in the "Herald," is a base malinger and falsifier.

I have always given Mr. Bilyeu credit for being an indefatigable worker in our legislative halls, and both Senator and Representative, irrespective of party who has served with him in the Legislature will bear me out in the assertion, that no man ever worked more faithfully, honestly and efficiently than he, to advance every measure that would be advantageous to his constituents and the people at large.

I write this in justice to Mr. Bilyeu and in vindication of myself.

On motion Mr. A. R. Cyrus was chosen to arrange the liberty car with the proper number of girls to represent the States.

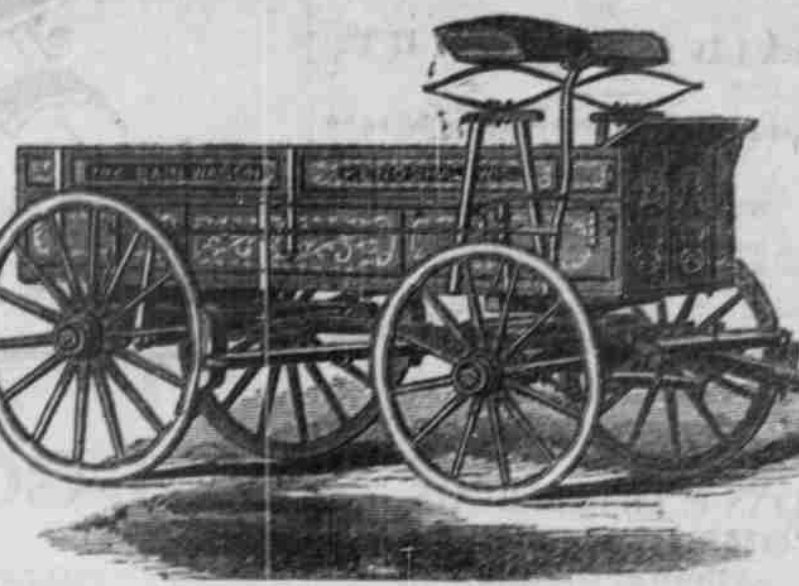
TEMPERANCE RALLY.
