RAILROAD ACCIDENT.

A Bridge Gives Way and Causes Eleven Fatalities into the Water.

The first accident of any moment that has ever happened on the O & C R R occurred last Tuesday morning at about 9 o'clock just beyond Aurora. The freight train was coming south, and was on the bridge crossing Faddling river, when one of the wheels broke completely in two, letting the car down with such a jar as to shake the bridge (which could not have been very strong), from its foundation and sending it with six flat cars loaded with rails for the extension south, and five empty box cars, to the bottom below, a distance of about thirty feet. The bridge was a simple span Howe truss with trestle approaches, and was 150 feet long. The engine rests in position at an angle of about 45 degrees, while the tender hangs over the edge. The former will be fastened and the latter cut loose and allowed to drop to the ground below. On the other end two more cars hang suspended in part, as they are. The engineer and fireman after sticking to their posts as long as they could do any good, crawled through the front windows of the engine and got out all right. The moon train from Roseburg hurried to the scene of the accident and brought back the passengers and mail from the Portland express. Since then only one train has been running, and the freight and passenger trains have been suspended with the exception of the one to the Dalles now, and we hear by next Monday.

Sudden Death.

Last Tuesday morning a little before eleven, the report was circulated that a man had dropped suddenly dead at Robinson's mill. A large crowd was soon congregated there, when it was found that Mr. Robert Berwick was the unfortunate victim of heart disease. Coroner Davis immediately called a jury which the proper testimony was taken to ascertain the cause and circumstances of his death. He had gone to work for Mr. Robinson that morning a few minutes before, and had been running a buzz saw when he fell and immediately expired. The first to observe him after his falling were Mr. Robinson and Mr. Metcalf, who supposed he was fainting a moment when they first observed him; but on examining him they discovered he was cold and clammy. Mr. Berwick had been troubled with the heart disease for several years, and for two or three months had been consulting with Dr. Hill for that disease. The jury found in accordance with the above, that deceased came to his death from the effect of phthisis nostralis of the heart. Afterwards his body was taken to his home near by, and he had a wife and three children, and had a brother-in-law residing with him. Both families came to this state from Canada last spring, when Mr. Berwick purchased the John Thomas farm near Tangent, and intended to move on to it next fall. He leaves his family in fair circumstances. He was a steady, straight forward man, and a member of the United Presbyterian church.
