HAD BEGINNING.

MANY of our readers remember the cold blooded murder of Col. Robert A. Alston by Capt. E. Cox, in Georgia in 1879, for which Cox was sentenced to the penitentiary for life. Governor Stephens has lately pardoned Cox, but upon what grounds we have not learned. We fear this is a bad beginning for Gov. Stephens.

ALL SIGNS FAIR.

ONE of the Congressmen elected by the democrats in Iowa at the late election was an earnest supporter of the prohibitory amendment in that State last June, so it seems it was not liquor influence that beat the republicans in that district at least. Again, Belgos, whom the democrats elected as Governor of Michigan is an outspoken prohibitionist. Like a rainy spell in Oregon all signs and excuses seem to fail the republicans when they attempt to enlighten the people as to the causes of their defeat. The truth is, the people were impatient, and sorely tired of republican rule.

NOT TRUE.

MANY Eastern papers, and especially Democratic papers, attribute the defeat of Page for Congress in California, to his support of the Harbor and River Bill passed by the last Congress. Such is not the case, as the matter, so far as we gathered from California papers during the campaign, was not discussed at all. Page's majority at previous elections was swept away by the general dissatisfaction with the conduct of the republican party in reference to revenue reform, and a modification of the tariff.

MAKING UP HIS CABINET.

It is said that Gov. elect Pattison of Pennsylvania, will appoint Hon. Lewis C. Cassidy as attorney-general; Hon. Wm. S. Steagler, Secretary of the Commonwealth, and Rev. Everett as his Private Secretary. These appointments indicate that Gov. Pattison will make his appointments non-partisan. There are some indications that Ex-Senator Wallace will antagonize Gov. Pattison's administration, in which event the party will go out of power at the next election in that State.

REFUSES TO ACCEPT.

AND now comes Mr. Manning who was the democratic candidate for Congress against Chalmers, and to whom the certificate of election was issued on the ground that, although Chalmers was elected in fact, a large number of votes were cast for "Chalmers," which were intended to be cast for Chalmers, and refuses to take the certificate issued to him on such a flimsy pretext. This is refreshing, and is in bold contrast with the ordinary candidate for Congress. It will be remembered that Chalmers was a democrat in the beginning of this Congress, but his seat was contested by his republican opponent, on the ground of fraud in securing his election. He was deprived of his seat by the aid of democratic votes, which he accepted, and he returned home and became the republican candidate for Congress, for whose election President Arthur and A. J. Hubbell labored and spent their money so freely. Chalmers was certainly elected and we hope the new Congress will not be slow in giving him his seat unless certain fraud in the election can be shown, as it is stated Mr. Manning will be able to do.

THE BEST CIVIL SERVICE.

MUCH is being said by the public press of the country, and by members of Congress in favor of the passage of a civil service reform statute to purify the civil service. While some such law might do something in the way of placing the civil service on a footing independent of the machinations of scheming politicians, yet it will never secure what the real, honest people of the country want, so long as the very head of the civil service of the country is merely a ward politician, a tool of the machine, who, it will be remembered, after the October election in Indiana in 1880, boasted that he had carried the election in that State by a free use of "soap," meaning thereby that Dorney, himself, and others had, by a free use of money, raised by assessments of government clerks, corrupted the voters of the State in the interest of Garfield's election. It matters not how stringent a law may be in force regulating the civil service, yet if the presidential chair is occupied by a man who could make the above boast, then would such a law be a dead letter. Such a man will always find an easy method of violating a law that stands in the way of his personal aggrandizement or yearning ambition. Civil service reform legislation would be a farce so long as Arthur has all federal appointments to make. A pure, honest administration may be had without any civil service law, if we have a President who is honest and pure, and earnestly desires such an administration, while it cannot be had otherwise. Then it remains with the people whether they will have these reforms or not. The polls is the place to determine it.

THE NEW YEAR.

THE New Year is now upon us, and the Old Year is about to pass out of sight, down the stream of time. While it is proper and right to enjoy the festivities, good cheer, renewals of friendship, and reunion of friends, which make up the joys of the holiday season, it was also proper and right, and we opine, a duty, to take a practical view of the change that is now about to take place. To those who believe "life is real, life is earnest," it will be natural to take a retrospect of the past year, and ask what mistakes have been made, what duties neglected, and what opportunities overlooked. The intelligent, practical, farmer will see improvements that should have been made last year but which, now, will never be made in their time and season. The wide awake merchant will see that his business policy has been wrong. The pastor of the Church will see that, had the power of the Church to do good, been turned either slightly to the right or left, much better results would have been accomplished. The teacher in the school room will find his teaching has been more theoretical and formal, than practical, and thus we might go on from vocation to vocation and from profession to profession, but time and space compel us now to ask, will we take advantage of the experiences of the last year? Will we avoid those evils and break off from those habits which have proven to be such a weighty burden the year past? Will we, the coming year, religiously perform those duties which we have so sadly neglected during the last? We know it is said that the beginning of the year is not a good time to make vows of future reform, but while we admit that it is not a better time than any other time of the year, yet we would say that it is a good time now, if you have not made them before. We know those who see and admit the earnestness and reality of life will profit in the future, by their experience in the past; but Oh! how many will blindly and unthoughtfully pursue, the coming year, the rugged, uneven path beset with pitfalls and snares which they so unhappily trod last year. We hope every reader will now vow to break off some evil habit which has indulged in the past year, for in doing so we believe we thus earnestly wish them "A Happy New Year."

AN OLD SLANDER.

THE Wasco County Sun under date of 20th inst., speaking of the rain fall says: "From the amount of rain-fall at Portland there would be reason to fear a repetition of Gov. Whiteaker's flood of 1861; but there is information that the rain towards the south has been less heavy. Gov. Whiteaker, it will be remembered, remarked in his message to the Legislature that there had been a great flood, and that it would have been still greater had it rained more." This mean, contemptible falsehood has been published from time to time, in republican papers, in Oregon, for the last eighteen or twenty years. About two years ago, the *Oregonian* told its readers, in a very confident manner, that Gov. Whiteaker said in his message to the Legislature which met after the flood of 1861, that "there had been a great flood, and that if it had rained more the flood would have been greater." This was promptly corrected at the time by a correspondent of the *Oregonian* which published the denial without comment.

Now in order to fasten this falsehood upon its authors, we have gone to the trouble to obtain an extract from the message embracing what the Governor said about the flood, and we appeal to all candid readers to say if what is said, is not well said. Here is what the Governor said:

"Indeed, the high waters of December last did more than destroy property, and desolate homes; and many human lives were lost while attempting to escape the floods or generously assisting to relieve others from their perils."

The unprecedented cold winter which followed upon the heels of the inundation, seemed to be more disastrous to the farmer than the high water, which escaped the floods, seemed to be reserved for a harder fate; to perish from cold and starvation. It is estimated that full one-half of the horned cattle in the State perished, during last winter, either by drowning, freezing or starvation. Probably one-third of the horses, mules and hogs perished from the same cause.

These are great and trying calamities; such as the people will feel for years to come. Still it might have been worse; had it rained for two weeks, and continued warm as it was, the whole valley of the Willamette would have been covered with water from mountain to mountain. When the whole country must have been desolated, and in a measure, depopulated. So, when we reflect that the country is still left with the means for the support of all, that we have been blessed with a genial season, and an abundant harvest, and above all, a singularly healthy summer, we have great reason to be thankful to Almighty God."

We hope the *Sun* will have the manliness to give this extract a place in its columns, and call the attention of its readers to it. But we fear it will not.

MISCONCEPTION.

Probably no characteristic of the Democratic party is so little understood by Republicans, as the fact that the party is an indestructible one. That it may suffer defeat from year to year, and yet its organization remain intact. That under the most humiliating defeat it will arise with renewed energy, vigor, and determi-

nation, and go forward to contest the right of the Republican party to administer the affairs of this government. Of course, all Democrats who are indoctrinated in the cardinal and essential principles of the party fully comprehend the fact, and understand the reason, why the party can not die, although it may never succeed to power. The reason of this is, that the elementary principles of the organic law of the land constitute the chief tenets of the Democratic faith. Hence so long as our form of government remains, so long will there be a Democratic party to promulgate the fundamental principles upon which that government is based. Our government is one whose organic laws are written, and the Democratic party places itself upon that organic law which it adopts as its platform or creed. The Republican party on the contrary is destined inevitably to be a short-lived party. This is true, because, at one time or another it has refused to recognize the binding force of nearly every leading provision of the organic law of the country. In fact it went into power led by W. H. Seward who declared that there was a "higher law than the constitution of the United States" to which they would appeal when the constitution stood in the way of any purpose which they desired to accomplish. They can live only so long as they are the recipients of the spells of office, hence place and power are the very life-blood of that party, and when they go out of power, the party will tumble to pieces, because the power which held them together is withdrawn from them.

On the contrary, the very faith of Democrats determines them to strive for the mastery whether under favorable or unfavorable circumstances. This determination was most forcibly and eloquently expressed last week in the United States Senate by Hon. G. G. Vest, the junior senator from Missouri, as follows: Vest, continuing, said the great evil in the civil service was the Republican party. Some believe that the offices belong to them as a matter of right. Ignoring the people they proceed to tear each other to pieces about the patronage. This, more than anything, had contributed to their recent defeat. Replying to Hale's charges that the whiskey interest was an ally of the Democratic party, and Sherman's statement that the result of the recent election in Ohio was due to that alliance, Vest that for the last 20 years the whiskey interest voted steadily with the Republicans. To show on which side the liquor influence really was, Vest made an elaborate comparison between the states which voted for Garfield and those which voted for Hancock, of approximately the same population, showing, he said, that in the Garfield states were 109,193 retail liquor dealers against 57,742 in the Hancock states inhabited by the whiskey soaking Democrats, giving to the gentleman on the Republican side, representing, of course the intelligence and morality and religion and sobriety of the entire country, a clear majority of 50,456 saloons. [Laughter.]

Vest then instituted a comparison between the number of saloons in Republican states with prohibitory laws, and Democratic states without, drawing conclusions favorable to the latter. Vest denied that the Democratic party was held together by a hope of public plunder. If the party depended on that it would have gone to pieces long ago, and in conclusion he would say to the gentleman on the side of the chamber, you may defeat us again, that is in the hands of God and of the future, but so long as the love of local self government exists in the hands of the American people, so long under God will we meet you face to face and hand to hand to dispute your supremacy in these United States.

The offices may be in your grasp, political assessments may be at your command, the administration may be the supply tools of party to trample out the free suffrages of the people but again and again will we meet you and contest your right to ignore what we believe to be the great principles of this government, local self government, the right of communities to govern themselves so long as they do not interfere with the rights of others."

THE HOG LAW.

In your issue of the 15th under the heading of "Keep up Your Hogs." We find that you are pleased to call, "One of the Laws of the Land." In which assertion you are badly mistaken, as you have only published the Hon. Mr. Sappington's Bill as drawn and introduced in the Legislature, which was amended so as to apply only to certain counties and localities, and it only applies to that part of Linn County lying South of the Santiam River, and does not include the forks of the Santiam in its jurisdiction, from which you will see it is only the law of a portion of the land and not of the whole of Linn County as the Hog Law is the same as it has been for several years.
