Minnesota's assessed valuation of taxable property amounts to \$334,459,359; wheat from 259,794 acres.

In 170 colonies of this country there are 35,000 students. Of this number 15,000 are church members, 1,300 having professed conversion during the past college year.

R. B. Hayes of Ohio is the President of the National Prison Association of the United States. It is the first time he was ever legally incumbent of a Presidential office.

Statistics show that St. Louis manufactured 23,000,000 pounds of tobacco last year—6,000,000 more than in 1882. This places St. Louis ahead of all other districts in the country in tobacco making.

The four southeastern iron States, Virginia, Tennessee, Alabama and Georgia, produced 705,000 tons of iron last year, against 236,000 in 1880. The greatest increase was in Alabama, from 62,000 to 265,000 tons and the smallest in Georgia, from 35,000 to 45,000.

Eight hundred and fifty railroad trains arrive at and depart from Chicago daily—more than any other city in the world, it is said, London only excepted. This number is made up of 218 suburban, 173 regular passenger and 162 freight trains and extras.

The Second Adventists have made a new revision of the Apocalypse, and now fix the end of the world for November 4, 1884. It is to be feared that the unfortunate date will interfere very seriously with the Presidential election. But, then, it is about the only thing that could save the Republican party.

The Morrison bill has split the party wide open—the Republican party, we mean. The New York Tribune hopes on to it with canine teeth and quadrumanous claws like an enraged baboon. The New York Times beams on it approvingly as a step at least in the direction of tariff reform and commends it to the support of the anti-monopoly Republicans.

The Medical Record estimates that among 1,000 doctors the annual death rate ranges between 15 and 25, making a yearly loss of 1,800 physicians out of our 90,000. But the supply is such as to remove all cause of apprehension, for the number of our medical graduates in 1882-83 was 3,979, more than double the estimated number of deaths.

An Illinois philanthropist tells the poor to eat their bread and butter with the buttered side down. He argues very plausibly that the sense of taste is most acute upon the tongue, and that a much smaller amount of butter than is ordinarily used will be satisfactory. Unless the poor, however, can afford to pay top prices for butter the less their sense of taste is tickled the better.

The Commercial Bulletin's monthly fire record shows that in February there were 181 fires, where the loss was between \$10,000 and \$200,000, with another of \$500,000. Total loss seven millions. Adding January fires, the loss makes for two months nineteen millions.

A decision was rendered by the supreme court of the United States this afternoon in the long pending legal tender case of *Julian v. Greenman*. The court holds that the legal tender act of March 1, 1875, is valid and constitutional, and treasury notes issued under it are good, and legal tender in payment of all debts. The opinion is by Justice Gray, Justice Field dissenting.

The Senate committee on Public Lands decided by nearly a unanimous vote in favor of the forfeiture of the Texas Pacific and the Territorial land grant assigned to the Southern Pacific Railroad company. A motion was then made to restore the land to the public domain, and pending this action the committee adjourned. To restore these lands immediately to the public domain without other action than is provided in the House bill would, in the opinion of some members of the committee, leave the lands subject to appropriation under the existing laws for speculative purposes. It is proposed to consider and perhaps amend certain features of the House bill so as to make sure that the lands will be available for no other purpose than actual settlement. A special meeting will probably be called within a day or two to dispose of the matter.

The same being one for each 200 votes and fraction over one 100 cast for Hon. J. S. Smith at the last general election, and one delegate at large from each county. We also recommend that the new counties of Crook and Klamath send one delegate at large each to represent them in the Convention, and that the number of delegates, allotted to the counties of Wasco and Lake, from which those counties were formed, be apportioned between the old counties and the new.

The Committee recommend that the primaries be held on April 5, and the County Convention on April 11; subject, however, to the approval of the various County Committees.

The committee deem it fitting to present to the Democratic voters of the State the following considerations:

We see approaching an election of most vital import to our commonwealth in all its interests, both public and private.

Deeming honesty the best policy, and in striking contrast with the course of the opposing party, we have named an early day for the assembling of the State Convention. Our principles as a party will then be enunciated and our candidates placed in the field subject to the approval or condemnation of the body politic.

The variance in the vote of this State during the past few years, and especially the very close contest in the Presidential election of 1880, give us much hope that, notwithstanding our present minority, with harmony in our ranks and a well directed exertion of our strength, we shall carry off the palm of victory. But to assure this end it is imperative that all Democrats should contribute their undivided support and hearty co-operation, not only in the actual canvass, but from its very initiation the county primaries. We do not presume to trespass upon the province of our popular Convention, but do earnestly invoke all members of our party to put aside past differences and personal antagonisms, to unite in harmonious action in the various primaries, and to send full delegation of representative men to attend the State Convention. We have deemed it fitting to reduce the number of delegates in the hope of securing the personal attendance of those to be chosen. We especially recommend the formation of local clubs, where practicable, throughout the State.

Believing that the success of the Democracy is the welfare of the people, we cordially invite all persons, regardless of past political affiliations, who favor simplicity, economy and frugality in the administration of public affairs, to unite with us.

TEACHERS' INSTITUTE.

On the first of April a District Teachers' Institute for the Third Judicial District will be held in this city under the management of State Superintendent McElroy. These meetings are provided for by law, and are designed for the promotion of the public schools of the commonwealth. In these meetings the parent, the pupil, the teacher and, last, but by no means least, the State, all have an interest. On the effort put forth by each of these parties depends the success of these teachers' meetings. These convocations are far more important and beneficial than unthinking persons will at first imagine. Political parties have their meetings and gatherings to promote the welfare of their political creeds. Church organizations hold their annual meetings, quarterly meetings, convocations and conferences to build up and strengthen their influence. Beneficiary and benevolent societies do likewise. Then why should not all parties in interest in the forthcoming teachers' meeting put forth an earnest effort to make it a success. We have to see every teacher in the county present. In order that they may all attend, it will be necessary in case where teachers are engaged in teaching, for directors to grant a vacation in school for that purpose. We think this should be done freely and without requiring such teachers to make up such lost time. The teacher will be required to bear his own expenses while attending such institute, and if parent and pupil derive the benefit which is claimed from these meetings, these expenses are all to be borne by the teacher. We are informed that arrangements are being made by the committee of arrangements to hospitably entertain all teachers who attend the institute. It is desirable that school directors and other friends of education throughout the country will contribute to the success of the institute by lending their presence and taking part in the institute work. Among the important and indispensable duties of the citizen is to see that the young are educated and qualified to perform well their parts as citizens of our growing commonwealth. Hence, all efforts to raise the standard of our public schools should meet with a hearty approval of every citizen.
