The temper of the people on the question of monopoly is such that neutrality is impossible. The people will have to crush it, or be crushed by it.

The anxious inquiry as to Mr. Blaine's ability to carry New York is answered in the words of young Roosevelt, that "he can't carry one side of it."

It was a cheerful body of jovial undertakers that assembled in Chicago the other day and put up a tattooed ticket for the Presidency. There is no doubt, however, of the corpse being fully ready for the November funeral.

The present political contest is one of issues, and not phrases. It is very well for the Republicans to claim great friendship for working men, but the history of the last twenty years shows that the party is the friend of capital and not of labor. Wendell Phillips declared the Republican party was the machine by which the rich oppressed the poor.

Has the North West News, Oregon City Enterprise, Statesman and other Republican papers examined the election returns from Eastern Oregon where these journals predicted great loss of Democratic votes in consequence of the Democratic position on the tariff question? Increased majorities is the result.

One of the silliest things we have seen lately is a "commercial" article in the Talk in which the writer says there can be no doubt but that the influence of Blaine's nomination has strongly tended towards the establishment of greater confidence in business circles. Such silly stuff is unworthy a place in the columns of any newspaper claiming any degree of intelligence.

The Blaine ticket inspires immense enthusiasm. Upon the receipt of news at Corvallis two or three tools of the ringsters, five small boys, three buck Indians and a lot of squaws repaired to the edge of the town where they proceeded to burn powder to their hearts content. It was about the same here and elsewhere in Oregon. But the truth is the people don't enthuse. They are to have a campaign of trickery conducted by "the cunning man from Maine" in person, but this sham enthusiasm is too transparent.

It is the American farmer who controls the trade of the country. It is his products which give us an influence in foreign markets. But a big wheat crop does not mean now what it formerly did, and to maintain our trade we require varied industries. We must sell to the very people who are encroaching on our grain markets, and to widen the bounties of trade we must vary commercial attractions. That has been the policy of every nation which has succeeded in holding the world tributary to its productions. We should sell abroad the results of our skill as well as the products of our soil. In no other way can we maintain commercial supremacy.

A Republican at Halsey explains why that precinct gave only 45 Republican majority this year, while two years ago it gave 65 majority. He says that the late election a colored man who heretofore always voted the Republican ticket was led up to the polls by a Democrat and voted the Democratic ticket. Eight or ten Republicans standing by followed up and voted as the colored man did, taking tickets from the same package at the Judge's desk from which the colored man did. These men supposed the colored man was voting the Republican ticket, and the mistake was not detected until about ten of them had voted the Democratic ticket. The question at Halsey now is, can Republicans read.

REBELLION AGAINST THE TATTOOED CANDIDATE.

To show the extent of the opposition to Blaine among Republicans we give extracts below from a few leading Republican papers. The New York Times says:

"It is best after all, that James G. Blaine should be the candidate of the Republican party. His nomination has been urged with earnestness and sincerity by a majority of that party, and the majority must rule in this country, even when it is in the wrong. The party now appeals to the country with a candidate who stands for something. He represents the average of Republican principles and purposes, of Republican honor and conscience, as they now are."

We shall not be surprised if some Republicans who do not like Mr. Blaine resent with heat the allegation that a man, who as Speaker of the House of Representatives, bartered his official influence for private gain, who, as Secretary of State, made the enforcement of a swindling claim against a distressed and perishing sister republic the most conspicuous feature of his foreign policy, a man who has had no part or interest in the work done in the last five years toward the purification of the public service, is a fair type and representative of the party that saved the Union, freed the slave, and restored the national credit. There will be nothing ambiguous about the defeat of Mr. Blaine. He who runs may clearly read the verdict in advance: "A candidate unworthy of confidence, and a party too careless of its honor to be longer trusted with the nation's."

"One word as to the position of the Times. It will not support Mr. Blaine for the Presidency. It will advise no man to vote for him, and its reasons for this course are perfectly well understood by everybody that has ever read it."

The Boston Daily Advertiser says: "To a large section of the republican party the news that the fierce struggle at Chicago has ended by the nomination of Mr. Blaine, will appear ominous of disaster. To them the event will mean that the party of sound government and of high moral purpose is required to abdicate its place as the exponent of principles, and to undertake the exculpation of a man. And to them it will appear, as we believe, that the decision of a national convention no longer reflects the matured judgment of a great party holding itself responsible for the guidance of the nation, but is the chance result of a contest in which intense ambition, the most degraded political methods and the clamor of a mob within the hall of the convention have had a victory."

We need not enter upon any formal declaration of our own entire agreement with those republicans who thus fail to find in the nomination any fit expression of the established principles and avowed aims of the Republican party. The events of the last three days have given us no answer to the objections so often urged in these columns against the nomination of Mr. Blaine and against the course of Mr. Blaine as a public man, and have presented no contingency in which these objections could be waived consistently with truth or political honor. We have then nothing to retract and nothing to modify. With unabated devotion to the great purposes for which the republican party was organized and has been maintained, we declare our inability to support the nomination, either in the present aspect of the political field, or in any which now seems likely to present itself."

The New York Commercial Advertiser says: "President Arthur can afford to be beaten by the elements which have prevailed at Chicago. If the opinionated reformers, the cow-boys and the star route gang did not openly clasp hands to compass the result, they worked for a common object. Can the party successfully fight through a campaign in which it must be constantly on the defensive? Can the upright and intelligent voters of the party be persuaded to support Mr. Blaine? If the man the Convention has chosen to support President Arthur can approach in dignity, purity and in patriotism the administration we now are to lose, he will do more than the best judges of events and character have thought to be possible."

The Worcester Spy says: "But no candidate who has been thought of has so many resolute opponents among men who would gladly vote with the republicans if the republican party would give them a candidate for whom they could vote with good conscience. Mr. Blaine's admirers may think that they are unreasonable, obstinate and prejudiced, that they magnify small faults into inexcusable offences, that they make of slight objections insuperable obstacles, that they give too much weight to the evidence against Mr. Blaine's character and too little to that in his favor; that they exaggerate the personal aspects of the canvass, and do not think enough of its party aspects. All this has been said many times, and will continue to be said in varying forms of expression and diverse tones and temper, in the endeavor to persuade or drive into the party ranks the men who think Mr. Blaine is not a fit candidate. No doubt they will prevail with some of them, but there will be a remnant whose votes will be sorely needed, perhaps, will be indispensable, in the doubtful states, and especially in New York."

The Springfield Republican says: "The most prominent features of Mr. Blaine's parliamentary and diplomatic

career are the succession of celebrated scandals compromising his character as a legislator with corporation interests, the policy of intervention between Chili and Peru in behalf of the latter country, and his general disposition to advocate startling and showy schemes, awakening the distrust of the business classes. The Republican party, dazzled with the qualities which please the mob, have placed this nomination, thereby giving to the democratic party the greatest opportunity it ever had to recover power by the nomination of some clean, able, safe and progressive statesman, like Grover Cleveland or Thomas F. Bayard. New York is the vital state, and the nomination of Cleveland, with his views in favor of revenue reform, his conservative regard for material interests and his efficient administration, would undoubtedly win the support of the independent vote. If the democrats, on the other hand, make a doubtful nomination like Payne or Tilden, it will necessitate a third party nomination. But if the democrats will only rise to the magnitude of their opportunity they will make a strong appeal to the plain people who prefer an unassuming, honorable and safe leader to a demagogue of the speculative school of pretended statesmanship."

TILDEN DECLINES.

Samuel J. Tilden has written a long letter reviewing his letter of declination of 1880, and closes with the following: "At the present time the considerations which induced my action in 1880 have become imperative. I ought not to assume a task which I have not the physical strength to carry through. To reform the administration of the federal government, to realize my own ideal, and to fulfill the just expectations of the people, would indeed warrant, as they alone could compensate, the sacrifice which the undertaking would involve; but in my condition of advancing years and declining strength I feel no assurance of my ability to accomplish those objects. I am therefore constrained to say definitely that I cannot now assume the labors of an administration or of a canvass, undervaluing in no wise that best gift of heaven, the occasion, and the power sometimes bestowed upon a mere individual to communicate an impulse for good. Gratiated beyond all words to my fellow countrymen, who would assign such a beneficent function to me, I am consoled by the reflection that neither the Democratic party nor the Republican, for whose future that party is the best guarantee, does not now nor ever can depend upon any man for their successful continuous progress in the path of a noble destiny. Having given to the future, and having reached the term of my capacity for such labors, as their welfare now demands, I but submit to the will of God in deeming my public career forever closed."

PARTISAN.

Two weeks since we criticized the course of the Disseminator in the late campaign, wherein it admitted to its columns communications making very bitter attacks upon Judge Thayer, Supreme Judge-elect. The editor comes back and applies to us such choice terms as "unqualifiedly false," "ingrate," etc. Now, Brother Train, you shall have a monopoly of the use of all that kind of billingsgate. We shall not indulge in it. We asked the question that many others have been asking: "How could the correspondent who wrote from Lebanon in favor of Judge Flinn know all the points made by the Harrisburg correspondent who wrote in favor of Judge Thayer, when both were written for and published in the same issue of the Disseminator?" This is what the editor of the Disseminator was called upon to explain. But he ignores this matter altogether. We heard a dozen men inquiring if it could be possible that this was accidental. Brother Train you are badly off your balance when you say we wrote the article we did for the purpose of injuring you. We had no such thought. When you indulged in the use of these hard names towards us, you only convinced intelligent persons that that was the only defense you had.

The platform upon which the above candidates were nominated is utterly devoid of character, and ignores the liquor crime; the peril that threatens the homes, mothers and children of the land receives no attention, though much concern is expressed in the welfare and protection of sheep.

The position of the New York Times is one likely to give its party considerable uneasiness. It very clearly and emphatically declares that it will not support a tattooed candidate for President of the United States.

AMUSEMENT.

We like amusement. We always feel to thank any one who goes to the trouble of sacrificing time, money or effort, physical or otherwise, to arouse and set in action our liabilities. The great humorists of the day deserve many thanks for giving their time and attention to amuse the fun-loving people. The greatest humorist of the day in the Oregonian. Conducted ostensibly as a political journal, it succeeds half the time in making the people believe that it is bona fide, a representative journal of the g. o. p. But it is merely burlesque. In its acrobatic movements, it is attempting to show the laughter-loving people how many different attitudes it can assume upon the political tumbling ground of the day. Just before the late Republican State Convention, we found it posing before the people collected on the great political tumbling ground of the State, as an anti-protectionist, and independent. The curtain falls and during the interim Hermann, a protectionist, has been nominated for congress. The Oregonian, not from any principle or desire to be consistent, but for the purpose of affording fun and merriment for the people, enters heartily into his support. This performance over, and we find the Oregonian posing as a fiery anti-Blaine man, making the public believe that Blaine cannot carry New York, Massachusetts and several other states, all of which he must have in order to succeed. Since his nomination the Oregonian's acrobatic performances have followed each other, (and each contradicting the other), in such rapid successions that common observers have not been able to follow it in all its gyrations. The general belief is that since the Chicago convention it has had three or four performers who have appeared before the public as writers of the political articles and all to amuse the public. That journal may never find it out, but it is true nevertheless that people are disgusted.

MORE OPPOSITION TO BLAINE.

Opposition to Blaine and Logan seems to come from more sources than one. The following is from the Record, the organ of the Good Templars in California: "We will give a present to the Good Templar who will first send us an honest reason why temperance men should vote for Blaine and Logan."

Hatpeter's Weekly, Puck and the New York Times are making vigorous war against Blaine, and this causes Ohio Republicans to resolve to "boycott" all three of them. In one or two localities they have agreed to stop taking for patronizing any of them. This is a disreputable species of bomb dozing and intimidation that if practiced in the south would call aloud for interference by congress.

The Oregonian says: "The Germans are not captivated by the vigorous foreign policy of Mr. Blaine. They say they left Germany because the foreign policy of that country was too vigorous for them, and came here under the idea that the citizens of this country were not to be disturbed by foreign broils or commotions, or taken away from their homes and business for the Monroe doctrine, the balance of power below the equator or anything of that sort."

The tattooed ticket is composed equally of Half-breed and Stalwart.

A PROTEST AGAINST FIELD.

SALEM, Or., June 17th, 1884.

Editors Democrat:

The Standard seems, at times, to be endeavoring to work up a "Field boom" in this State. It seems to me that no Democrat ought to favor the nomination of Field. There are good reasons for this. The Democracy of this state have for years declared in favor of legislative regulating charges for fares and freights on railroads. The party everywhere favors this, and it should not nominate a man for president who does not agree with the party on this great question. How does Mr. Field stand on it? Will the Standard answer? He has, as Supreme Judge, made a record on this question that pleases the most ardent monopolist. He has decided that the legislature has no constitutional power to regulate fares and freights. His views on this question may be formed in his dissenting opinions filed in what are called the Grange cases. It is possible that any Oregon delegate will support Field at Chicago? Field has made a record on another important question—the Thurman bill. Every Democrat in Oregon or anywhere else favors the Thurman bill, but Judge Field has held that it is unconstitutional. According to Field everything that tends to make R. R. pay their debts, or to prevent their extortionate charges, is unconstitutional.

The Democracy of this State will remember any delegate who votes for Field for president. I have been told that Field, or his friends, paid the expenses of the Oregon delegation four years ago. A vote for Field is a base betrayal of the Democracy. No true Democrat will vote for him. Nearly every County in his own State has repudiated him and instructed against him. The Democracy of California know him and would not support him if nominated. The Standard ought to explain why it favors a man who has such a record on the monopoly question.
