THE REBEL FLAG.

For a week prior to the holding of the Cleveland and Hendricks ratification in this city last Friday evening, it had been whispered around among republicans that a rebel flag was to be displayed on that occasion. One report had it that a woman would actually come out and carry such flag in the procession. Another had it that two ladies, (both democrats, and possessed of more patriotism to the square inch than any other two ladies of the city,) one living in East Albany and the other in West Albany, were actually making rebel flags with which to decorate their houses on the occasion of the ratification. Still another report had it that two boys had been selected to carry the flag in the procession. There were many other wild rumors afloat which aroused much feeling among republicans. Democrats very industriously hunted up these reports, and in each case, traced them to republican sources. No democrat could be found who knew anything about this flag. Each democrat, however, pledged to every other democrat, "his life, his fortune and his sacred honor," that no such flag should be carried in the procession. These reports continued to pass from mouth to mouth among republicans and kept them worked up to fever heat. The report that the lady in west Albany would decorate her house with rebel flags was persistently peddled in all directions and expectation ran high. On Friday noon this lady began the work of decorating her mansion and preparing for its illumination. The first thing was to almost literally cover the front of her residence with American flags of various sizes. This was a great disappointment to those republican late-bearers who had been assiduously circulating these reports with the evident purpose of disturbing the peace of the good citizens of Albany. Time wore on, Friday night came and darkness settled down upon the city like a pall. Fire rockets soon began to illuminate the darkened heavens. As if by magic, residence after residence in all parts of the city, poured forth their great beams of light upon the vision of four thousand democrats.

Great bonfires and the booming of cannon gave expression to the thousands of jubilant democrats ratifying with overflowing zeal the election of Cleveland and Hendricks. The streets in all directions were filled with jubilant democrats answering back with joyous acclaim "Hurrah for Cleveland."

While all this was going on the Argus' evil form of a forlorn follower of the "doomed knight" was wending his way along the street of a distant part of the city, when, in the darkness of the night his eye caught the outlines of an illuminated house, where resides a highly respectable widow lady. On her front porch was an illuminated banner which attracted the attention of our young "knight." It was a suspicious looking thing. He gazed long and intently at the banner. Of a sudden, in a fit of the most spasmodic excitement he whispered the words audibly "It's it!" "It's it!" "That's the rebel flag!" "By the gods, it must come down."

With lightning speed he rushed on to the crowded streets of the city where he gathered up a few straggling republicans and told them of the discovery. They returned to a dark corner near the widow lady's residence and there they had a fair view of the banner. The discussion was long and animated as to whether it was really a rebel flag or not. But they could not agree. The news of the discovery spread. One aged and devoted follower of the man of Mulligan fame said to a number of young knights "You go and tear that rebel flag down, and if you can not do it the old men will." But again doubts crept into the minds of the excited crowd as they wondered in their minds whether it was rebel flag or not. One young man declared that his father told him that he once saw a man that lived in Dakota who was acquainted with a man in Rhode Island who was informed by a negro who lived in Benscombe county North Carolina, that a rebel flag was made by making a cross with two wooden bars with 13 stars painted on the bars. This did not suffice. Then a runner was sent to bring in all the college professors, students, men of ripe scholarship, and all who understand flagology, to settle the question but in all this array of scholarship and wisdom no one was found who could unravel this strange device.

But one or two of these young men who were imbued with as much courage as Blaine exhibited when he did not vote for the Maine prohibitory amendment wanted to tear this rebel flag down anyway, but better counsels prevailed and the crowd dispersed to their respective places of abode. On the next morning bright and early a large young man was seen prowling around in the streets near the widow's place of residence to get a daylight view of the rebel flag. Sure enough there it was and our brave and valiant knight approached stealthily near enough to get an open view and, mirabile dictu! it was a crazy quilt. Thus ended the story of "That Rebel Flag."

The New York World and other democratic papers of New York are urging the propriety of electing Conkling to the U. S. Senate! The New York legislature is republican on joint ballot but it is believed there are enough stalwarts to join the democrats to elect Mr. Conkling. There would be much good sense, outside of all political considerations, in filling pigmy Lapham's place with an intellectual giant like Conkling.

THE RATIFICATION.

The ratification of the election of Cleveland and Hendricks held in this city last Friday was the largest political gathering ever held in Albany. A full account will be found on another page. It was most that democrats who had so long been contending for the faith that is in them should congregate to celebrate the great victory thus obtained.

As showing the sentiment of the people gathered together on that occasion we give below the resolutions adopted:

Resolved, That the democratic party and independent republicans of Linn county join with the democratic party of Oregon in the adoption of the following resolutions:

This meeting of the democracy of Oregon participated in by many independent republicans, who, at the late election voted for Grover Cleveland and Thomas A. Hendricks, especially desiring to give clear expression of gratitude at the result which has been accomplished, and of earnest hope for the success of the administration soon to be inaugurated, does declare and

Resolves, That we tender to the great body of the democratic electors of the states of this federal union, our earnest, hearty and sincere congratulations. We recognize in this last act of supreme and courageous devotion to duty; that fidelity to the cardinal doctrines of democratic faith—a strict interpretation of the written chart of our liberties and a simple, frugal and honest execution by the general government of the powers conferred—has at last brought to a victory that no device of fraud nor expedient of crime can controvert or overthrow.

That this election will demonstrate that this government is not the property of a party; that a change of parties can be effected without danger to the country or injury to any of its material interests, and that this is an untiring test of the capacity of a people for self-government; and it will disprove the monstrous assumption that one-half of the people of this country are its dangerous enemies.

That we do not celebrate the achievement of a mere party victory nor a conquest of the spoils of office. And we commend the declarations made by the president-elect in his letter of acceptance in respect to the civil service, and bespeak for his administration the credit of establishing before the world that in this government public office is a public trust, and that capacity and fidelity are the only indispensable qualifications to its exercise.

We extend cordial greetings to the independent republicans who, in the interest of the public good, and with the courage of sincere convictions, rallied to the support of the democratic standard bearers; whatever their future political action may be they have earned our highest respect. We value them as worthy of all honor. They have emancipated the people from the tyranny of party, and have given to the better class of men that commanding influence in the direction of public affairs which the public interest requires, and which is of right theirs.

BUTLER.

In our issue of last week we showed that it was intolerant and un-American for Republicans to prescribe St. John and those who voted for him for the course they pursued in the late campaign. We see some foolish persons met in a Massachusetts town a few days ago and burned Ben Butler in effigy. Now, while the Democrats have a far greater provocation to prescribe Butler for the course he pursued than Republicans have for prescribing St. John, yet we insist that Democrats are not justified in such prescription of Butler. True, Butler was a delegate in the National Democratic Convention that nominated Cleveland and participated in its deliberations, on an equal footing with the other members of the convention, and in morals was bound by the action of the convention in the nomination of Cleveland. In fact, he made a special pledge to the Massachusetts delegation that he would support the nominee of the convention whoever he might be. He was thus under the strongest moral obligations to support Cleveland, instead of offering himself as an independent candidate with the evident purpose of defeating him. St. John, in his relations with the Republican party, had no such obligations resting upon him. He went to both Republicans and Democratic conventions and asked a favorable consideration of his prohibition scheme and was rejected by both, both having notice that prohibitionists would act independently if their requests were not granted. We are not saying that there was sound judgment or good sense in his being a candidate. We are not saying either that there was sound judgment or good sense in Ben Butler's being a candidate, but, on the contrary, we do say that Butler's being a candidate had no justification in any sense of the word, but withal that, we are prepared to admit that the question whether he would be a candidate or not was finally to be determined by himself alone. This he had a right to do upon the broad and liberal Democratic doctrine of freedom of political action.

Hence, we say, that the practice of burning presidential candidates in effigy and otherwise heaping stigma upon their name and fame, simply because in consequence of their being candidates, other candidates have lost votes has no justification whatever.

The ratification of the election of Cleveland and Hendricks at Portland last week was the most magnificent political demonstration ever held on the Northwest coast. There were over 4000 in line and the spectators numbered from 15,000 to 20,000.
