A THRILLING EXPERIENCE!

FAIR DEALING.

Many methods have been proposed to correct the evils attending our present system of assessment and taxation. Before the passage of the mortgage tax law, a grievous evil existed in that many men refused and neglected to list their notes to the assessor and they thus escaped taxation to the amount of the notes which they held. Another evil grew out of the fact that large sums owned in one county were loaned in another county, and in consequence of undervaluation, the land mortgaged to secure these loans paid no taxes because they were often assessed at a sum equal to the amount of the mortgage, while the notes were taxed, (when taxed at all,) in the county where the owner resided, and the land escaped. These two evils were corrected by the passage of the mortgage tax law. It is now said that another evil exists in this, that while mortgages are assessed at their full value, lands are greatly undervalued, and it is now proposed to repeal the mortgage tax law to abate the above named evil. But this would drive us back to the evils from which we have escaped. The people are in no mood to turn backwards on this subject. They are largely opposed to the repeal, and propose to look forward to such legislation as will secure substantial justice to all concerned. They look forward to this legislature for such legislation as will secure equal and uniform taxation upon all kinds of property. Let lands and all other property be taxed at their full value. Let mortgages be assessed at their full value and in the county where located, let deductions be allowed for bona fide indebtedness and all grounds of complaint will vanish.

Wet Winters in Germany have been found to result disastrously to insects, each season of food greatly lessening the "bug crop" of the following Summer.

Prof. H. Munk, a worker of some eminence in agricultural chemistry, says that moderate muscular exercise increases the yield of milk, but that violent motion hinders the process of milk secretion. Dairy farmers may turn his remarks to profit.

After many observations at sea level and at 15,000 feet above, Prof. S. P. Langley concludes that the mean absorption of light and heat by the atmosphere is at least double the usual estimate of twenty per cent. He believes, also, that dust particles play a more important part in this absorption than is generally supposed.

A mountain explorer, just returned from Asia, states that during a four months' residence at a height of more than 15,000 feet above the sea his pulse, normally only sixty-three beats per minute, seldom fell below 100 beats per minute, and his respirations were often twice as numerous as at ordinary levels.

One of the remarkable things which botanists tell us is that we have more plants of the Japanese flora than Europe has, and that even the Pacific Coast of America has fewer than are found on the Atlantic slope. A few American plants may have reached Europe by natural means, but in the main the course of plant migration has been from the Old World to us—from west to east.
