A CAMPAIGN SECRET GIVEN AWAY.

In the campaign of 1884 the two candidates for governor in a "pivot" Western state arranged for a series of joint discussions. Both men were popular, both of fine appearance and were so well matched in mental force and as orators that the contest between them promised to be a magnificent one. For several weeks the scales balanced evenly.

But one day the brilliant Republican candidate came up ailing. He seemed overcome and spoke laboriously. The next day he was even less effective. Later he was compelled to ask his opponent for a postponement of certain appointments, which was granted. Before the campaign ended he had abandoned the field altogether. Meantime the Democratic candidate continued his canvass, seeming to grow stronger, cheater and more effective with each succeeding week. He was elected. One evening in December while entertaining several gentlemen he said:

"I will tell you a campaign secret—which gave me the election. With the opening of my campaign I began caring for my liver. TEMPERANCE DEPARTMENT.

APPEAL TO MINISTERS.

TO THE CLERGY OF THE UNITED STATES: The Centennial of the Temperance Reform is to be celebrated during the week commencing September 20, 1885. It has been proposed that every minister preach a sermon on Sunday the 20th, bringing the subject before his congregation in such way and manner as he may deem best, and that every Sunday School hold exercises appropriate to the occasion. The National Temperance Society, Woman's Christian Temperance Union, and other National Temperance organizations unite in this request, and the Presbyterian General Assembly at its recent annual meeting recommended its ministers to preach sermons on temperance on that day. We cordially invite and urge ministers of all denominations in the land to unite with their fellow-workers, and let there go up a united and strong protest against the giant evil of intemperance, and earnest prayers be offered for the deliverance of our land and people from this desolating scourge.

The celebration is especially one of education and of a temperance literature. The great fundamental truths of the temperance movement must be brought with power and vigor before the American people until a public opinion is created against drink and the drink traffic. The little pamphlet of Dr. Rush was a mighty power in forming public sentiment in the early days of the movement, and a sound temperance literature is still the great bulwark of the reform.—M. T. Advocate.

In nineteen counties of Indiana there are 1,132 saloons, and in nine counties there are no saloons. In the nineteen counties there is one prisoner for every twenty-two votes, in the nine counties there is one for every seven hundred and twenty votes,—being ten times as many where liquor is sold.

An eastern paper says: Archbishop Farrar has met the challenge of the brewers with firm and manly front, they having threatened to aid in the work of disestablishing the church, if the clergy dared to oppose the liquor traffic. Speaking recently at Leeds, he said the church of England had faced popes and kings, and was not going to recoil before the threatened vengeance of publicans and brewers.

Abraham Lincoln was a total abstainer for fifty years. On his election to the presidency a large number of citizens crowded to the White House to congratulate him. When the audience room was full he cleared it by one of the practical jokes of which he was fond. "Gentlemen," said he, "I am sure that you will agree with me that on this auspicious occasion we should drink each other's health." This proposition was greeted with applause. Soon a servant appeared carrying a tray with a number of glasses and a large decanter of water. Turning to his guests the President then said, "Gentlemen, we will now drink each other's health in the best beverage given to man, pure cold water." Subsequently the President added to one of his friends, "That water joke effected two purposes—it cleared my room and gave them a lesson in the disease of strong drinks."

From the Illinois Eastern Hospital for the Insane, at Kankakee, comes this testimony: "We pay out over half a million annually for the care of the insane; in all ways, considerably over that amount. There are accommodations provided by the state for, in round numbers, about thirty-five hundred insane, which can be cost, on an average, not much less than \$800 per capita, and have probably cost more. From 12 to 20 per cent of the insane owe their disorder directly to drink, and indirectly a much larger number. I should say that 25 per cent is too small an estimate for the whole number who owe their insanity, directly or indirectly to intemperance.

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HISTORICAL.

St. Marks column in Venice, on the summit of which rests the lion of St. Mark, was brought from the Holy Land in the twelfth century.

In olden times it was the fashion of persons of distinction when visiting to be accompanied by a trumpeter, who announced their approach by a flourish of his trumpet.

The Accursed Street was the name given to the thoroughfare in ancient Rome where the daughter of Servius Tullius was reputed to have driven over the corpse of her father after he had been murdered by the emissaries of Tarquin, her husband.

According to Malone it was once a common custom, on the breaking out of a fray, to call out "clubs, clubs!" to part the combatants. "Clubs," too, was originally the popular cry to call forth the London apprentices who employed their clubs for the preservation of the peace.

In days gone by there was but one salt cellar upon the table, which was a large piece of plate generally much ornamented. The tables being long the salt was usually placed about the middle and served as a rt of a boundary to the different quality of the guests invited. Those of distinction were ranked above, the space below being assigned to the dependants, inferior relations of the master of the house, and so forth.

It can be conceived possible, says Froissart, that in a hot fire of the squadrons of the French and English met near Cherbourg, 1379, the knights and squire, having dismounted to fight closer, stopped in the midst of these furious transports to give one among them who remained on horseback the leisure to challenge that knight among his enemies who he esteemed to excel the most in love.

The most prosperous days of the Four in Hand Club of London were in the reign of George IV, 1820-1830. The noted Lord Onslow was a member and was ridiculed in the following epigram: What can Tommy Onslow do? He can drive a coach and four. Can Tommy Onslow do no more? He can drive a coach and four. To throw the gloye as a signal of a challenge is alluded to by Shakespeare, when Troilus says to Cressida: For I will throw my glove to Death himself.

That there's no maculation in thy heart. The meaning being, says Johnson, "I will challenge Death himself in defence of thy fidelity." The glove then thrown down was popularly called "a gag," from the French, signifying a pledge.

MECHANICAL.

The Belgian coal trade is not very narrative. The official returns for 1884 show that the profit on the total output was one-seventeenth of a cent per ton.

The largest boiler locomotive ever constructed is under way at the West Albany shops, 52-inch shell of 7-16 iron, with 228 tubes, and weights over eight tons.

Black birch wood is prized in Europe for fine cabinet work. It seems, however, that there is a strong prejudice against this wood among architects in this country, although it is cheap, beautiful and pretty durable.

There are 8500 railroad bridges in the state of New York, and each one of them is to be critically examined by experts and repaired where found necessary. A large amount of railroad building will be undertaken on Aug. 1.

A South Carolina genius claims to have invented a perfect system of car coupling by electricity. Upon a recent trial a freight train was cut in four pieces and again coupled up without the aid of any person except the conductor, who did the entire work from the rear car. The invention, if successfully introduced, will save many hundreds of lives annually.
