Frank Peterson, son of W. A. Peterson of this city has been appointed postmaster at Philomath. One by one.

A special election will be held in Yamhill County Nov. 2, to elect a Senator to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Senator Warren.

The game is up in Virginia. The bottom has dropped out of the Mahone conspiracy, and the Mahone candidates are very dead cocks in the pit.

Gen. Lee will be elected Governor by a great majority and a Legislature will be chosen with him whose first act will be to retire Senator Mahone to disgraceful oblivion.

Once in a while, Hoar, the Michigan buffoon, says a bright thing. For instance, when he said of the democratic-greenback alliance in Iowa "neither end of it dare look the other in the face."

Mr. Stevenson is the individual known in official circles as "the grim reaper." He has been known to throw his headman's axe and kill a fourth-class postmaster at a distance of ninety paces.

It is said of Davenport, the Republican nominee for Governor of New York that he was never seen to laugh. He is the man, therefore, of all others for the mugwumps to support—and they are supporting him with all the furious vehemence of a well-behaved summer zephyr.

Last week Judge Vincent of New Mexico appointed Stephen W. Dorsey, a member of a commission to draw grand and petit jurors for that territory. President Cleveland promptly suspended the judge. Dorsey, it will be remembered, was one of the leading stragglers under the fraudulent presidency of Hayes.

Mr. Sylvester Johnson, a distiller, at New Haven, Ky., has donated \$42,000 to Catholic institutions in the State to be distributed as follows: St. Mary and Elizabeth Hospital, \$12,000; to Nazareth Academy, \$15,000; to Little Sisters of the Poor, \$10,000, and to St. Joseph's Infirmary, \$5,000. Mr. Johnson has previously made large donations to the institutions.

Frederick Wheeler, Chairman of the Prohibition Committee of New York, has proposed to give a Republican at Albany, New York, \$10 for every man the Republican would produce who voted for St. John last year and was going to vote the Republican ticket this year, if the Republican will pay him \$1 for every Blaine man he, Wheeler, could bring who was going to vote the prohibition ticket this fall. The Republicans declined the offer.

The Roseburg Review says: "Daniel Manning resigned his chairmanship of the New York Democratic state central committee when he was appointed Secretary of the Treasury. We make this statement for the benefit of Republicans who do not, or cannot read."

WHAT SHALL THEY DO?

The question is being discussed somewhat among Democratic papers as to what course the Democratic members shall pursue with reference to the coming extra session of the Legislature. It has been suggested by way of innuendo that it would be wise and judicious on the part of the Democratic members to refuse to attend, or to absent themselves or resign and thus prevent the expenditure of twenty or twenty-five thousand dollars of the people's money to enable the Republicans to wrangle again disgracefully over the election of a Senator.

Our contemporary, *The Mountain Sentinel*, suggests that the Democratic state central committee should be called together to advise and direct the Democratic members what to do. What power or authority the state committee has to direct in the matter is more than we can conceive of. The effort of the committee to do so would be justly resented by the members as an insult. We think there can be but one thing to do in the case. These members are public officials. They all accepted office well knowing that they were liable to be called at any time to attend upon an extra session of the Legislature. It is their duty to do so, and perform their duties faithfully to the state and to their party. The Republicans are wholly responsible for the extra session with all its drawbacks. Democrats need have no fear upon this point. Let the Democrats all attend and, if possible, elect a Democratic Senator and secure the best legislation possible for the people, and their constituents will say, well done.

PROF. CHAS. W. ROBY.

This gentleman has been appointed postmaster at Portland vice Geo. A. Steel commission expired. The Portland papers all speak of the appointment as a good one. Prof. Roby was born in Wisconsin in 1850 and emigrated to this state in 1880, and settled in Portland where he has been connected with the public schools ever since. At present he is principal of the Park school. He was formerly a republican but for the last twelve years has been identified with the democratic party. It is said that it was through the influence of Postmaster General Vilas, with whom Prof. Roby is personally acquainted, that he secured the appointment.

ANOTHER GOOD APPOINTMENT.

The President, last week, appointed Judge B. F. Bonham to be Consul-General at Calcutta. We can unreservedly say that this appointment is one that will meet with hearty approval from the people of Oregon without regard to party. Judge Bonham has been upon both the circuit and supreme benches of this state, and has so scrupulously performed the duties of these stations, as to call forth encomiums of praise from bitter political opponents. We congratulate Judge Bonham on this recognition of his ability and integrity. As a democrat, we love to be called upon to note such appointments.

We want to say to our Republican farmers that we hope they have not forgotten the argument which Hon. B. Hermann, congressman, used a year and a half ago, when canvassing the State as the Republican candidate for congress, in favor of a protective tariff. He told the farmers that they, too, were protected by the tariff as there is a duty of twenty cents per bushel on imported wheat. Well, now there is no election pending, and what we say can not be ascribed to us as given to influence some election, hence we are bold to ask our Republican farmer friends how much they think the tariff helps them to get a good price for wheat? Are you getting that good price now under our present high tariff laws? You were also told that a high tariff would also bring you a good market for all you produced. Is it so?

The Legislature has been called in extraordinary session entirely in the partisan interest of the Republican party. It should not be forgotten by those who pay the taxes to meet the extraordinary expense thus incurred that it is done for party benefit. The plea is made that the whole State is interested in having a Senator, but while this may be true it should not be forgotten that that party is responsible for the State's now being without a Senator. If the Democrats should act in a purely partisan way, (which they have been invited to do by the course of the Republicans,) then Republicans will be set upon from consoling. It was the duty of Republicans to elect last winter, and no excuse can be given for not doing so.

Now that the Governor has called an extra session of the legislature, we hope when it meets the members will be able to see that there are many important matters demanding their serious consideration besides the election of a Senator. While to the mere politician the election of a Senator may be the all-absorbing subject of thought, yet to the great mass of the people of the state, legislation affecting their material interests calls forth the most serious consideration. The registry law, the liquor license law, the assessment law, the law regulating freights and fares will all force themselves upon the consideration of the legislature. Let a Senator be elected upon his merits, (if one is to be elected at all), and let legislation be placed upon its merits.
