

NOTES.

The Mercury which, for some time, has shown itself to be one of the most reasonable and sprightly Republican journals in the state, has unwittingly allowed itself to fall into the "far back" rut in which that party so long wandered. It comes in at this late date and sings that hackneyed song which Republicans have been singing for twenty years, that the Democratic party is dead or just about to die. How amusing to a Democrat, when he looks back to the time when his party could not carry five states in the union, when this song was so gleefully sung by Republicans and then followed down the manful and patriotic struggles of his party and see it gradually growing in strength and numbers until in 1876 when it had grown as strong as to have a majority of 250,000 of the voters of the entire country, and all this time Republicans continued to sing this song seemingly unconscious of the fact that they themselves were on the downward road that leads to death. And this vigorous growth in the party continued until it swept into power over the prostrate form of the g. o. p. in the election of Cleveland. And now Republicans are talking about the approaching death of the Democratic party because Cleveland now and then appoints a Republican to office. We emphatically declare that if the offices were all the party gained in the election of Cleveland then, indeed, was the victory a barren one. No office is not essential to the life of the Democratic party. It lives and thrives well without office. But who would dare say that if the Republican party should now remain out of power twenty years, that, at the end of that period, there would be any Republican party left. It will certainly die without the offices. It is almost certain that it cannot live without them.

FORFEITURE OF LAND GRANTS.

Judge Payson, of the House Committee on Public Lands, says there are under consideration bills to forfeit about 100,000,000 acres of land, and include all the Northern Pacific land grant, and nearly the entire grant of the Atlantic and Pacific. Many of the lands are also in Michigan, Iowa and other states. The committee is in favor of the forfeiture, but the opinion is that Congress is unfavorable to making sweeping measures. Probably that much of the report on the Northern Pacific will be confirmed. The committee does not seem to take the view urged so strongly by the Oregonian a year or so ago. Its position there was, that if a railroad company to whom was granted lands to aid it in the construction of a proposed road, failed to build it within the time, and upon the conditions prescribed in the act of Congress granting such lands, but built it after the expiration of the time prescribed by Congress, it then earned the lands and acquired such an equitable interest in them as to entitle them to the legal title. We combated this view at the time as not being good law, and we are very much strengthened in our view of the matter by the position of the House committee.

WHY THIS DELAY?

It is generally contended for the party in power in a state to take the first steps towards calling a State convention, when an election approaches. The party in power is supposed to have the advantage ground and to be willing to put on a bold front to inspire its followers with courage and confidence in its ability to win, especially in this the case where a party has a large majority as the Republicans claim to have in this state. But despite these facts the leaders of that party have indicated no purpose as yet to set the ball rolling, though we are at the very last of January, while in former times they have usually met as early or earlier than the middle of this month. What has become of the courage, boldness and daring of that party? Who will answer?

WATTS.

We hope the Democratic State Central Committee will wait until the Republicans call their convention before calling ours. This seems to be the feeling among Democrats hereabouts.

It would appear that the Welcomes assumes to speak for the Democratic party in the matter of nominating a candidate for Congress. It declares substantially that no Democrat has any chance of an election by its favorite, Hon. J. M. Garin, of Multnomah. We have no war to make on Mr. Garin, for, if nominated, we would support him cheerfully. But the Welcomes' style of urging his nomination is calculated to secure his defeat rather than his nomination. Then, the people, again, throughout all parts of the State, look upon Portland's demand for the next Congress as an exhibition of sublimity in cheek, in view of the fact that she now has both Senators. The Welcomes' purpose to belittle all Democrats outside of Portland will have the effect to defeat its favorite Portland candidates.

ON A RACK.

On account of the low price of wheat flour will be sold at the Magnolia Mills at \$1.10 a sack, or \$4.40 a barrel, and will be delivered free to all parts of the city.

A SMALL CHERUB OF COMFORT.

The Eugene City Register says: "On the prohibition question, the silver question, the tariff question, the civil service question, and in fact each and every question, the party in power is badly divided and the situation anything but a happy one." Our esteemed contemporary seems to extract a deal of comfort from the contemplation of the above divisions, that are anything but happy. But how about similar divisions in the Republican party? Did not the Blaines become raving mad last fall in consequence of the overwhelming defeat of Blaine as a result of division among Republicans on the prohibition question? We must be permitted to say that, to Democrats, this division among Republicans was a very "happy" one. But how is it on the silver question? A close canvas of the lower house of Congress stands as follows on silver: Against suspension of silver coinage, 212. For suspension, 113. Of the 212 opposed to suspension 142 are Democrats and 70 are Republicans. Of the 113 in favor of suspension 37 are Democrats and 76 are Republicans. So it seems Republicans are as "unhappy" divided on the silver question as Democrats, with this material difference in favor of the Democrats, so far as the great masses of the people are concerned: A large majority of the Democrats stand by the people in favor of silver, while a large majority of the Republicans stand by the gold bugs of Wall Street and against the material interests of the people. On the civil service, tariff and many other questions both parties are alike divided. So far as we are concerned, we have no disposition to hide these divisions in the Democratic party. It is indicative of a healthy condition of individual thought. As large as political parties have grown in this country in consequence of the great increase of population, it can not be expected that all members of the same party will entertain the same views on all great questions of public concern that may come up for public discussion. Democrats opposed to a further coinage of silver, or free whisky, or high tariff, are equally loyal to the great cardinal principles of the party, as those who take opposite views on these same questions. Hence our contemporary will find these differences of opinion among Democrats an infinitesimal crumb of comfort so far as it hopes to break up the party with them.

EDUCATION IN THE SOUTH.

The Philadelphia Times, an independent political paper, in treating of the subject of popular education in the South says that it must not be assumed that the Southern States have been remiss in enlarging facilities for popular education since the war. On the contrary, considering their resources and their extreme necessities, they have greatly surpassed the North in their efforts for the education of both races. The good work was hindered by the profligacy of carpet-bag rule, that collected school taxes and promised education to the colored race, but wasted or stole most of the school revenues. Since the reconstructed States have been allowed home rule, they have made marvelous strides in popular education. South Carolina, where war left its legacies in direct vengeance and desolation, pays nearly half as much for free schools as does Pennsylvania, and employs more colored teachers than are employed in all the Northern States combined, while Mississippi, the only other Southern State in which the colored race predominates, offers better advantages to colored pupils for higher education at the cost of the State than does Pennsylvania. All of which seems to knock another prop from under the already tottering structure upon which Republican leaders have so confidently relied.

The Wasco Sun is doing valiant (i) service in the cause of that prevailing style of Republicanism known as "bloody whittierism." It has now so far progressed towards the issue of the present time as to make a vigorous attack upon Buchanan's administration. If it should continue in this rapid line of progression, in fifty years it will reach Cleveland's administration.
