Death of a Pioneer of '48.

Two weeks ago the DEMOCRAT announced the death of Mrs. S. T. Jones. Only a few days elapsed before her death was followed by that of her husband, Mr. Jones dying on last Sunday morning at 1 o'clock. He was buried near Millers on Sunday afternoon. Samuel T. Jones was born in Kentucky on June 2nd, 1826, and came to Oregon in 1848, being one of Linn county's earliest pioneers. He owned four hundred and eighty acres near Millers, on which he lived a great many years, highly respected by all who knew him. Mr. Jones was a man of upright character, noted for honesty and faithfulness to his obligations. He was married twice, his first wife being Miss Nancy Miller, and his last wife, just deceased, Sarah J. Holman. Several children, and a brother Mr. Jas. F. Jones are still living here, to mourn the loss of a father and brother. One by one the pioneers of Linn are passing off the stage of action, leaving behind them a county, among the most prosperous in Oregon as a monument to their early sacrifices and hard work.

These Registry Books.

Last week we gave the bids presented to our County Court for furnishing the Registry books for Linn county. J. K. Gill & Co. bid being \$1, at that time the lowest. Since then Mr. C. W. Watts has made arrangements by which he offered the books to the county for 85 cents apiece, and the offer has been accepted. We believe this is the lowest any county in Oregon gets the books at. W. B. Ayer & Co. is reported as already furnished them to sixteen counties at the price of \$3 a book; but we opine it will be a dear bargain for that firm. The Portland Standard is authoritative for the statement that the actual cost of these books when 1000 are printed is 45 cents a piece. Of course printers printing less, as many have, must content themselves with fifty, can not do the work at that cost. 85 cents for this county will leave Mr. Watts only the good will of tax-payers for having furnished them at that price. As much has been said on the subject all over Oregon we present Linn county's experience in the matter.

In the last two issues of the DEMOCRAT notice has been made of the stealing of some tools from Mr. J. F. Backensto, of this city, last week an account being given of the finding of some of them at Jefferson. Since then the Section boss on the O. & C. R. R. found a few more in an old building near the track in this city. A clue was gotten to the thieves, resulting in the capture of Ben Stewart and William Fenton at Eugene by Deputy Sheriff Cochran. Building in Albany in 1886.

The indications now are that the coming will be a lively building year in Albany, as well as an active building year. Besides several residences not necessary now to mention and railroad buildings for the O. P., the Catholics will construct a fine school building on their grounds near the College. The plans for the same, we are informed, are being drawn; but when bids will be let we do not know. The estimated cost is given to us at between \$30,000 and \$35,000. The building is to contain five or six school rooms and fifty or sixty bed rooms for students, and, when completed, will probably be the largest structure in Albany.

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CHIEF ENGINEER'S REPORT.

Chief Engineer Hoffman's annual report has been handed into the Common Council. Below we give the substance of it, lacking space to present it in full:

Water Supply.—There are eight cisterns in good repair, the water supply in which on last examination ranged from 4 feet 6 inches to 11 feet 8 inches, the average being about 8 feet. There are three hydrants in the city, two on First Street and one at the depot.

Apparatus and Buildings.—The Department is supplied with a second-class Cowan & Co's hand engine and 600 feet of hose; a fourth-class Clapp & Jones steam engine with cart, harness, attachment and 1000 feet of hose; a Fred J. Miller hook and ladder truck and outfit. No fire engine house has been repaired since last year's report. No fire engine house has been repaired since last year's report.
