

Lin County Democratic Convention.

A Democratic Convention for Lin County to elect delegates to the State Convention and to nominate a full county ticket will be held in Albany on Friday, April 9th, at 10 o'clock, a. m.

The Democratic County Convention which meets to-day has an important duty to perform. They will select the men as candidates who will serve as county officials for the next two years.

The public well will be best subserved by making the Jeffersonian test the rule of action in the Convention.

Equally important is that of Representative and Senator. There never has been in the history of the county so fine a prospect for an overwhelming majority as now.

A good ticket, heartily supported, will give a much larger majority than we have ever had. Then, let the proceedings of the convention be characterized by harmony, earnest, honest work, and then let all hands join in hearty support of the ticket, and all may rest assured that the majority will be at least 300.
