T. V. Powderly, the grand master workman of the Knights of Labor, is a native of Carbonate, Pa., where he was born in 1839. By trade a machinist, he has made himself a civil engineer. He was Mayor of Scranton for two years and has served six years at the head of the great labor organization. The 50 Treasury Department watchmen are to be armed with breech-loading rifles and supplied with ammunition, that they may be in readiness to meet an invading foe. At one time during the war, the able-bodied clerks in the Treasury Department were organized into a regiment, which had its band and colors, and used to drill one afternoon in each week. When the Confederates under Early came within the outside intrenchments of Washington, they expected to encounter nothing more formidable than the Treasury and other department regiments, under the redoubtable Quartermaster-Gen. A cement very much used at the present day in China and Japan is made from rice. It is only necessary to mix rice flour intimately with water, and gently simmer the mixture over a clear fire, when it readily forms a delicate and durable cement, which answers all the purpose of common paste.
Disinfectant has shown that boracic acid is not always of volcanic origin, but that vast quantities exist in the salt lakes and saline marshes, all the elements of which are of a sedimentary character, and which amid more or less complex physical and chemical changes have nevertheless their origin in the evaporation of normal marine basins.

It would buy nearly two million barrels of the best grade of flour—enough to furnish a year's supply of bread for four hundred thousand people—more than the entire population of the cities named.

Is it any wonder that Cincinnati is in constant terror of riot and murder, fire and pillage, when such a flood of devil's broth as this money represents is annually poured down the throats of her citizens?
Let it be remembered that these statistics are for malt liquor alone, and do not include wines or alcoholic liquors, of which an enormous additional amount is consumed. Let it be remembered, also, that the statistics are not those of "temperance fanatics," but a body of business men, who have collected them for business purposes.

A French physician, M. Jolly, who has devoted much time to the close investigation of the subject, declares that an "increasing tendency to mental diseases has been generated by the increasing consumption of alcoholic drinks; and in proportion as liquor drinking increases, so do paupers, vagabonds and beggars, suicides, idiots, dwarfs and murders increase." What is thus affirmed by an expert as true in France is also undoubtedly true of our own country. The city is for more room in connection with insane asylums, prisons, hospitals, and poor houses. The worst aspect of alcoholism is its leacy of race deterioration through the law of heredity. In total abstinence only is there health and safety for the nation.

The new Mayor of Indianapolis has declared his intention of enforcing the laws against the sale of impure literature and the superintendent of police has supplemented this by ordering the policemen to enforce the ordinance forbidding the exposure of impure papers in news depots.
