

"Bob" Taylor and "Alf" Taylor are model brothers. They are both candidates for Governor of Tennessee. "Bob" is running on the Democratic ticket and "Alf" is running on the Republican ticket. They are canvassing the state together. The white rose is a symbol of democracy and the red rose represents republicanism. If you see a Tennessee with a white rose you may rest assured that his whole mind and purpose is bent on electing "Bob" Governor. Likewise if you see one with a red rose he is equally devoted to "Alf." Large crowds of people meet the brothers everywhere they go. They are both good violinists and are often called upon to amuse the people on their electioneering tour by joining in a piece of music on the fiddle. They have just completed their canvass of East Tennessee, where the Republicans are largely in the majority. Here Republicans were disposed, as is usually the case with those in the majority, to annoy "Bob," and even went so far as to be discourteous to him, but "Alf" interfered and told them that "Bob" was his brother and that he could not remain silent when he was mistreated. When they entered on their canvass in West Tennessee the other day, where the Democrats are in the majority, some of them were disposed to go "Alf," the Republican candidate, but "Bob," the Democrat, came forward and told the audience, and especially the unmannerly Democrats, that an insult to his brother was an insult to him, and that if "Alf" were not treated with due courtesy they would both leave the field. The campaign is a remarkable one on account of the relationship of the candidates and the peculiar fraternal esteem in which they hold each other.

LET THEM ASK IT.

The Princeton Review says the people of that city have today to ask for from the forthcoming legislature except an appropriation of four or five thousand dollars to build a school house in that town, as the people of that town cannot afford to build one for themselves. While the Review means to be sarcastic, yet if the people of that place should ask such an appropriation, it would be just as lawful and as reasonable for the legislature to grant it as it was to make an appropriation of fifteen thousand dollars to build a wagon road from Hogen to Crisp, in Union county, or to appropriate ten thousand dollars to build a bridge across the river at Grant's Pass. And we think it would be better policy to build a school house at Princeton than to give five thousand a year to run the State Fair.

DON'T TALK.

The young man who localizes on the Herald is very much dissatisfied with the way Postmaster General Vilas is running the post office department. He objects to Democratic economy of course. Acting Secretary Fairchild has made another call for the redemption of \$15,000,000 of 3 per cent bonds of 1882. This makes \$73,000,000 since July 1st. This ought to satisfy to the full those who have supported the surplus resolution.

The Portland and Salem papers are having huge vendictive war over the claims of their respective cities. Salem is afraid that Portland will literally swallow her up, and Portland retorts that she would not swallow some things that Salem has even if she could, and mentions Salem's miserable hotel, insane asylum and penitentiary. Albany will take part in this row after awhile, but she has not time now.

Mrs. Clara Foltz, the lady lawyer who lives in San Francisco, and who has been a life-long Republican, has sworn all allegiance to that party, and will stump that state in the interest of the Democratic ticket. It will be remembered that she lectured in this city a few years since.

The Courier De San Francisco, the principal organ of the French population of California, which has heretofore been radically Republican, has swung into line and is now booming Bartlett and the balance of the Democratic ticket. To an observer at this distance it now looks like a sweeping victory is in store for the Democrats of California.

The Democrat, published in San Francisco, the oldest German daily on the coast, has formally severed its connection with the Republican party and given in its adhesion to the party of the people—the Democratic party. Reason asserting her dominion.
