

The Herald, of this city, upon the authority of "Mr. R. W. McBride, resident minister at the Warm Springs Indian Agency," makes an attack upon Jason Wheeler, Agent of that reservation, by saying that its reporter obtained from Mr. McBride some "interesting information" concerning the political and social workings of the reservation. The Herald does not specify what these particular "political and social workings are," but makes a vague charge by insinuating standing against Agent Wheeler, which, to say the least, is unfair and untrue. It is said that "much dissatisfaction is being created by recent subordinate appointments on the reservation." We are then told that a clerk from Mississipp, a physician from Ohio and an additional farmer from Tennessee have been appointed, and this going East and South to obtain "men to run Indian affairs" is called a "remarkable procedure" by the Herald, but that paper is very careful not to disclose how it is "remarkable," just as it, with much discretion, failed to tell about the "social and political workings of the reservation." It is evident that the purpose exists somewhere to cast reflections upon Mr. Wheeler's official conduct at the reservation, without assuming any responsibility for making charges. While we are not informed as to the details of making appointments of physician, clerk, etc., on the reservation, we would suggest that it is probable that these appointments were made by the department at Washington. We know nothing about the workings of the reservation, but from our long and intimate acquaintance with Mr. Wheeler, we would be very slow to believe that his management is bad. If Mr. McBride has any charges to make against Mr. Wheeler's management of the affairs at the reservation he should do it directly and in language that may be understood. We have no defense to make for wrong doing, and if it can be shown that wrong exists we shall join in among the first to condemn it.

TANGENT.

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State Normal School.

The State Normal school opened its fifth year with more flattering prospects of a successful year's work than ever before. It opened with more students in attendance than ever before in its history. Three weeks are now gone, and both teachers and students are well pleased with work done.

There are now 127 students enrolled in the college department, with 55 in the primary. Seventeen counties of Oregon are represented. The number from each county is as follows: Polk, 63; Marion, 16; Linn, 12; Lane, 9; Yamhill, 8; Benton, 3; Umatilla, 3; Washington, 3; Baker, 2; Multnomah, 2; Josephine, 2; Clackamas, 2; Wasco, 1; Grant, 1; Jackson, 1; Clatsop, 1; Gilliam, 1; and Idaho Territory, 2. The names of students attending from Linn county are Anna Wilds and Elwin Houston, Albany; J. A. Buchanan, R. S. Montgomery and H. Montgomery, Clatsop; Clara McMeekin, Wm. Woodbury, Ella White, Jean McDaniel and Lillie McDaniel, Harrisburg; Vida Worth, Sadaville; S. Shedd, Shedd Station.

New students are arriving every day. At the rate they are coming the school buildings will hardly be roomy enough to accommodate all who may wish to attend by the beginning of next term.

NEW APPOINTMENT.

The question of making a new appointment of members to the legislature among the several counties of the state will come up before the next legislature. Under Section 5, of Art. 4, of the constitution of the state, it is made the duty of the legislature to cause an enumeration of the white population of the state to be made in 1885 and every ten years thereafter, so that five years after the census of the United States is taken the state enumerates its own population, thus making an enumeration of the population of the state every five years. By Sec. 6, Art. 4, of the constitution of the state, it is made the duty of the legislature, at its next session after the census of the state has been taken, either by the United States or by the state, to fix by law the number of Senators and Representatives and apportion them among the several counties of the state, according to the number of white population in each. It has been six years since the census of the state was taken by the United States, and yet the legislature has persistently refused and neglected to do this duty. Several attempts have been made in the legislature to make this apportionment, but, unfortunately, the dominant party sought to make it in such a way as to give it a political advantage rather than to perform a simple sworn duty, and the attempts have failed. The population of many counties has increased that the number of Senators and Representatives of some counties is out of all proportion to the number of inhabitants. Clatsop and Tillamook, with a population of 7000, has one Representative, and Linn, with about 12,000, has six Representatives. Umatilla, with 10,920 inhabitants, has one Representative, and Douglas with 8053 has four Representatives. Multnomah, with 35,000, has seven Representatives, and Polk, with 6316, has three Representatives. A fair apportionment under the constitution of the state, so far as political parties are concerned, will result in some advantage to the Republicans, but this, in no wise should affect the action of any Democratic member in giving his willing support to such a measure. Duty to the state as well as obedience to his oath of office are above all party considerations. Fair-dealing and a love of justice should induce the legislature to support the members of that body as to give Clatsop, Multnomah, Wasco, Umatilla, Morrow and other Eastern Oregon counties their due representation. Let this work be fairly and impartially done under the constitution and all will be well.

ELECTIONS NEXT MONTH.

On November 2nd the following states will hold elections for Governor and other state officers, Congressmen and legislative and county officers: California, Colorado, Connecticut, Delaware, Massachusetts, Michigan, Minnesota, Nevada, New Hampshire, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, South Carolina, Tennessee, Wisconsin.

The following elect minor state officers, Congressmen, legislative and county officers: Arkansas, Florida, Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Kansas, Kentucky, Louisiana, Maryland, Mississippi, Missouri, Nebraska, New York, North Carolina, Ohio, Rhode Island, Texas, Virginia and West Virginia. The only interest of importance that attaches to these elections is as to the result on Congressmen. The Democrats in the last Congress had a majority of 43. Most of the nominations for Congressmen have been made by both parties. There are so many elements of doubt entering into these elections that it is difficult now to forecast the result.

Besides the Democratic and Republican parties, there are greenbackers, prohibitionists, workingmen and other local organizations of different kinds in various parts of the country, whose entering upon the field of political action will very much mystify the result. At the present writing the indications are that the Democratic majority in Congress will be materially reduced, and it would not be surprising if the majority should be entirely wiped out.

The nomination of Henry George by the workingmen and trades unions for Mayor of New York proves to be a matter of much concern to the Democrats of that city. Although the Democrats have over 50,000 majority in the city they are divided into three wings, Tammany Hall, Irving Hall and County Democracy, and there appears to be but little hope that these factions will unite on a city or county ticket. If the Republicans of that city who control the party organization were not in such bad repute they would now have a golden opportunity of wresting municipal power from the hands of the Democrats, who have not acted wisely nor well in governing that city, but the Republican leaders are equally to blame for all the bad administration to which the people of that city have been subjected. The result of the elections to come off in that city next month is yet clothed in Chamberlain darkness.

The President has appointed Quincy A. Brooks, of Klamath county, to be Collector of Customs of the Puget Sound District. Mr. Brooks has been on the coast since 1850. He was postal agent under Lincoln's administration, and was Quartermaster General of state militia in the Madoe War. The appointment is a good one.
