

INEQUALITY.

The following are the articles on which the bulk of the tariff taxes are levied, and the statement shows the amount of revenue derived from each and the rate:

Nearly all of the above articles are necessities. In fact, with the exception of the three last items, they may all be classed as such. The one hundred and thirty-five millions which our tariff laws draw from the people as a tax on the necessities are paid for by poor and rich alike, not, however, in proportion to wealth, but in proportion to numbers. The poor laborer with a family of five children pays three times as much of this tax as does the millionaire and his children. The molasses which his children eat, the sheep clothing which he and they wear, the iron in his spade, the medicine which they take in time of sickness, the leather in their shoes, the earthenware off which they eat are all taxed in order that the money may be piled up in the treasury or be squandered by extravagant law makers. This tax is just as heavy a tax as if it were paid at the corner grocery where the goods are bought. If a man should go to a store and buy a dollar's worth of sugar and in leaving was forced to pay the tax collector another half dollar in addition to what he paid the store keeper the result would be just the same as that produced under the present tariff laws, and yet we are told that tariff taxes are making the country prosperous.

It will be a great blow to John Sherman, and not pleasant news to Mr. Blaine, to learn that a committee of the Legislature of Connecticut, having a Republican majority, has reported favorably a resolution that goes to the heart of the only remaining professed principle of the Republican platform makers that has any vitality in it. This resolution declares that the Federal taxes on imported lumber, coal, iron, wool, salt and copper ore, are an injury to the interests of Connecticut. The declaration is entirely true. These taxes are an injury, not only to the interests of Connecticut, but to those of the whole country, and particularly to the manufacturing interests. They make manufacturers of almost every sort more costly, and they add to the cost of living while reducing the wages of workmen. These truths, that are as obvious as that two and two make four, and not five or three, have been generally recognized by intelligent students for many years, but they have, so far as possible, been kept secret from the Republican voters. That they should now be inducted by a Republican committee in a manufacturing State is an ill omen for those who, like the two gentlemen named, have been banking on the continued ignorance and gullibility of the manufacturing communities.

The "Thunderer," as the London Times is called, is the highest priced newspaper in the world. It is sold at three pence per copy, while every one of its principal competitors is sold for one penny. Notwithstanding this it holds its own against all competition. It is very common among Englishmen to poke fun at the Times, nevertheless, it is a potent factor in the politics of Great Britain, and while it is evidently on the wrong side of the Irish question, it is the power of that paper that makes the sentiment in favor of coercion so strong.
