THE RAILROAD COMMISSION.

The commission has made the following recommendations to the O. R. & N. Co.: "Recommendations for depot facilities at Dallas City, Oregon.—The board having examined the condition of The Dallas as respects depot accommodation, and finding that said city is without a depot building or other facilities for the accommodation of the traveling public arriving and departing therefrom, would respectfully represent to the Oregon Railway & Navigation Company and its lessees, that the commission deem the early construction of depot buildings at said point a matter of great importance, and would recommend that suitable depot buildings be at once constructed, with such accommodations as will meet the requirements and necessities of said city. This recommendation is urged for the reason that the present arrangement for stopping passenger trains, partly in the street and partly over Mill creek, is inconvenient, unsatisfactory and even dangerous."

REDUCTION OF RATES.

Following is its recommendation for a reduction of rates: "The board would recommend to the O. R. & N. Company that its tariff of rates on wheat, flour, oats, barley, rye, farina, flaxseed and potatoes be reduced to the following schedule of rates: When in carload lots of 20,000 pounds, from all points east within the State of Oregon to Portland, Oregon: Rates per 100 pounds: The Dalles, Summit and intermediate points, 15 cents; Celilo, Deschutes and intermediate points, 16 cents; Grant's, John Day, Quinn and intermediate points, 17 cents; Blalock's, Arlington, Willows, Shipburg, Castle Rock, Coyote, Stokes and intermediate points, 18 cents; Umatilla Junction, Foster, Echo and intermediate points, 19 cents; Barnhart, Pendleton, Eastland, Adams, Centerville, Cayuse, LaGrande, Union, North Powder, Baker City, Huntington, Cold Springs, Juniper, Milton, Blue Mountain and intermediate points, 20 cents. And the board would also recommend that the Oregon Railway & Navigation Company reduce their tariff of rates on wool, when in sacks or compressed bales, to the following schedule of rates, to-wit: From all points east within the state of Oregon to Portland, rates per 100 pounds: Rowena, The Dalles and intermediate points, 37 cents; Celilo, Deschutes and intermediate points, 45 cents; Grant's, John Day, Quinn, Blalock's and intermediate points, 50 cents; Alkali, Willows, Coyote, Umatilla Junction and intermediate points, 60 cents; Foster's, Echo and intermediate points, 65 cents; Barnhart, Pendleton and intermediate points, 75 cents; Cayuse, Huntington and intermediate points, 75 cents; Centerville, Blue Mountain, Milton and intermediate points, 75 cents; Cold Springs, Juniper and intermediate points, 75 cents."

The present rate per ton of shipments on flour, wheat, etc. from The Dalles is \$4 per ton, and the rate recommended is \$3, a reduction of 25 per cent. Other reductions have been recommended on about the same basis.

THE NEXT NATIONAL CONVENTION.

The Democratic National Convention of 1888 will consist of 820 delegates, divided as follows: The New England States, 76; the Middle States, 150; the Southern States, 306; the Western States, 242; the Pacific States, 25; the Territories and the District of Columbia, 18. The two-thirds rule obtains in the grand caucus of the Democracy, and the man who will be nominated will have to receive, therefore, 547 votes.

It is suspected that Fairchild is a candidate for president and this is a part of his tactics to defeat Cleveland. Mr. Fairchild will learn in due time that he is too small a man for president.

"BOYCOTT."

The Portland News has been "boycotted" by the liquor dealers of Portland because that paper has seen fit to support the pending prohibitory amendment. They not only withdraw their own patronage, but are "boycotting" those who patronize the News. The News publishes the names of those who have withdrawn their patronage, and now it will receive ten fold more patronage from the prohibition people than it has lost through this silly "boycott." We know of nothing so foolish as boycotting a newspaper for expressing its opinions, for that which is sufficient reason to justify one person in withdrawing his patronage might be sufficient to induce two others to support the same paper. Suppose, now, in view of the fact that the Oregonian takes the anti-prohibition side and the News the prohibition side of the pending question, that the prohibitionists of the state should "boycott" the Oregonian; what a loud cry against such fanatical intolerance would we hear from anti-prohibitionists all over the state. No, this is a free country and men's mouths are not to be shut at the dictation of a few narrow-minded boycotters.

Ex-Governor C. S. Salomon delivered an address on Memorial Day in San Francisco, in the course of which he said: "When I strew my flowers upon the honored resting place for one who died that his country might live, I consider it sacrilegious to decorate at the same time the graves of men who died in an attempt to destroy and ruin the country for which we fought."

Hon. Binger Hermann, our Congressman, on the same day delivered an address at Roseburg, in the course of which he said: "In honoring the blue, let us as an emblem of a restored nationality, tenderly drop a flower upon the soldiers who were the gray. The victor and the vanquished dwell together again in peace, and as we hope with a single purpose and a common effort to advance this country in her onward march of unexampled greatness and grandeur. A new and a regenerated South arises from the ashes of desolation; the old flag floats over all and the stars and bars which was lowered at Appomattox will never be raised again."

Which is the true patriot and devoted lover of his country? We venture if this question were asked of the old soldiers of the Union, nine-tenths of them would decide in favor of our Congressman.

The northern part of California, including Sacramento, will yield about the same amount of wheat as last year. The yield in San Joaquin Valley is placed at 60 per cent and from San Francisco south, west of the Coast Range, the yield will not exceed 40 per cent of last year.
