

THE FLAG.

Now, what surprises us about these rebel flags is this: Way back in the good old days of "Auld Lang Syne," about sixty years ago, a law was passed by Congress that all flags captured in battle by American troops should be taken charge of by the war department and displayed in some conspicuous place as every day reminders of the bravery and prowess of American soldiers. But, alas, for the degeneracy of the times and the fickleness of human nature, Gen. Grant had no patriotism enough left after the war was over and he became president to "display" these "trophies" of the war, but for eight years kept them boxed up and stored away in the attic and cellars of the war department absolutely shut out from the gaze of every patriot. Under Hayes, the fraud, the same policy of disloyalty was pursued. Under Garfield and Arthur no development of patriotism was shown concerning these flags. Oh, how the very frame of a Fairchild or a Tuttle must have trembled and shook with indignation at this lack of patriotism on the part of Grant, Hayes, Garfield and Arthur, and how earnestly Fairchild would have indulged in one of his "paleys" prayers if these had not been Republican presidents. Here it was that Fairchild with an almost superhuman effort managed to keep his lips closed, as he so dramatically tells us he had done in times past. If Tuttle and Fairchild could be as earnest, enthusiastic patriots when a Democrat is president, as when a Republican is president their patriotism would overshadow that of any other citizen.

SLIPPERY GROUND.

Many Republican papers, notably the *Wasco Sun*, *Oregonian* and others that seem very desirous to make the "bloody shirt" the issue in the next presidential campaign, are saying that Cleveland is devoid of patriotism and adduce as proof, the fact, that during the war he furnished a substitute rather than go himself. Now if such conduct is proof of disloyalty on the part of Cleveland, then thousands of the great leaders of the Republican party to-day stand convicted of being traitors to their country; ay, blame himself, the great model Republican, the great mogul of his party, must be looked upon as a traitor to his country, for he not only furnished a substitute, but allowed his friends to pay such substitute, and, then in after years, when his town by vote levied a tax to raise money to refund to those who had furnished substitutes he accepted this money though his substitute had cost him nothing. The less Republicans say about Cleveland's substitute the better they will appear before the public, for when they talk on that subject they are on very slippery ground.

When the civil war broke out there lived in Western New York three young men, brothers. One of them, a lawyer, just beginning to practise, was the sole support of his widowed mother and his sisters. These three young men at that time held a conference and decided that two of the brothers should volunteer and the third should stay at home and earn money to provide for the other members of the family. Accordingly these two brothers fought through the war in the Union army. Unfortunately, the young man who stayed at home was drafted, and he procured a substitute refusing to plead these facts which would have exempted him. Afterwards when New York State was reimbursing those who hired substitutes, this young man patriotically refused to accept a cent. This is Grover Cleveland's war record, and they who say that Cleveland was opposed to the Union in the time of the civil war are either ignorant of these facts, or they desire to ignore them, to spread misinformation, to aid in propagating sectional hatred, and to keep alive the discord between the sections.

Those interested in the picturesque social history of New York and New England, during the early years of this century, will find some exceedingly bright and entertaining pictures of that period in Scribner's Magazine for July from the letters of Eliza Southgate Bowne, which are here published under the title of "A Girl's Life Eighty Years Ago." They are the observations of a keen-witted girl, who has preserved for us, as though by some mental instantaneous photography, a set of pictures of her day. She was connected with many influential old New York and New England families, whose descendants have carefully preserved these letters. They were written with perfect frankness to members of her family from Portland, Me., Salem, Boston, Ballston Springs, New York, and other places. Among the illustrations are miniatures, silhouettes, and some reproductions from prints of old New York. The selections from these letters will be concluded in the August number of the Magazine.
