AGAIN WE ASK: "ARE YOU CANDID?"

Again we appeal to fair-minded republicans who have been led to believe that President Cleveland favors free trade to compare the vital text of his message with the views of many leading republicans, and then candidly say whether the message means "free trade."

"It is not proposed to entirely relieve the country of this taxation. It must be extensively continued as the source of the Government's income, and in a readjustment of our tariff the interests of American labor engaged in manufacture should be carefully considered, as well as the preservation of our manufacturers."

Now, then, read the following from Mr. Cleveland's letter of acceptance: "The cost of government must continue to be met by a tariff duty collected at our custom houses upon imported goods and by an internal revenue tax assessed upon spirits, liquors and malt liquors, tobacco and oleomargarine. We propose, therefore, to stimulate our domestic industrial enterprises by freeing from duty imported raw materials which by the employment of labor are used in our home manufactures, thus extending the markets for their sale and permitting an increased and steady production with allowance of abundant profits. True to the undeviating course of the democratic party we will not neglect the interests of our laborers and our workmen. In all our efforts to remedy existing evils we will furnish no excuse for the loss of employment or the reduction of the wages of honest toil. On the contrary, we propose, in any adjustment of our revenue laws, to encourage such encouragement and advantage to the employes of domestic labor as will easily compensate for any difference that may exist between the standard of wages which should be paid to our laboring men and the rate allowed in other countries. We propose, too, by extending the markets for our manufacturers, to promote steady employment of labor, while, by cheapening the cost of the necessities of life, we increase the purchasing power of the workingman's wages and add to the comforts of his home."

Compare the above views of President Cleveland with the views of leading republicans as shown below:

General John A. Logan, April 18th, 1870: "Now when the gentleman, who seems to be the protector in an especial manner of the great labor interests of this country, speaks of this protection being the protection of the labor of this country, I ask him: Does not every farmer and mechanic in this broad land make use of all kinds of labor? The 4,000,000 men that have been freed recently are laborers, are producers, not manufacturers. They are not men of the tariff, but they are men who are not men who are protected. And then there are the men in the Northwest who produce corn, wheat, oats, pork and beans, etc.; they are producers and consumers, and are not protected; and it is they who pay this large amount of money into the pockets of the manufacturers of this article. And when a gentleman stands upon this floor and tells me that this high, this extraordinarily high tariff, for the protection of the laboring men, I tell him that I do not understand how he can possibly substantiate such a theory."

My republican friend, read that again and then say which is the free trader, Cleveland or Logan.

James A. Garfield, April 1st, 1870: "Duties should be so high that our manufacturers can fairly compete with the foreign product, but not so high as to enable them to drive out the foreign article, enjoy a monopoly of the trade and regulate the prices as they please. This is my doctrine of protection. If Congress pursues this line of policy steadily we shall, year by year, approach more nearly to the basis of free trade, because we shall be more nearly able to compete with other nations on equal terms. I am for a protection which leads to ultimate free trade."

Garfield has always been regarded as the oracle of his party. Which is more nearly a free trader, he or Cleveland?

A total abolition of excise taxes would almost inevitably prove a serious, if not an insurmountable obstacle to a thorough revision of the tariff and to any considerable reduction in import duties. The present tariff system is, in many respects, unjust. It makes unequal distributions, both of its burdens and its benefits. I recommend an enlargement of the free list so as to include within it the numerous articles which yield inconsiderable revenue, a simplification of the complex and inconsistent schedule of duties upon certain manufactures, especially those of cotton, iron and steel, and a substantial reduction of the duties upon those articles and upon sugar, molasses, silk, wool and woollen goods."

Now we ask our republican readers to carefully read and compare these openly expressed views of the great leaders of their party with the views of President Cleveland as expressed above, and then candidly and honestly answer the question whether they consider the views of Mr. Cleveland that of a free trader. They can not candidly say they do. President Cleveland has not taken nearly so radical a position on tariff reform as nearly all the republican leaders in the last decade. We might give extracts from speeches and writings of scores of others who made the republic party great, such as Allison, Folger, Grant, McCulloch, Sherman, Hale, Ingalls, Lodge, Long, McKinley and scores of others taking stronger ground in favor of tariff reduction, did space permit. No candid man who reads Cleveland's message or the Mills bill would think of saying they mean free trade.

"A wool grower writes to ask if the price of wool is not affected by the duty, and whether it would not be greatly to the interest of our wool-growers if the former rate of duty were restored. In Oregon the duty makes little difference either way. The reduction of duty on wool, effected by the act that passed the last Congress was quite small, and in all probability if the amount were restored the Oregon wool-growers would never know it from any change in the market. Again, wool is governed in price more largely by its distance from the manufacturer and the cost of transportation than by the duty and hence wool of like quality sells lower in Oregon than in London, because it is further from the manufacturer."—Oregonian, Sept. 21st, 1884.

Sound as a dollar is this argument and statement of fact, but no sounder than now. But the Oregonian's subservency as an organ grinder necessitates its eating crow, hence it is compelled to go back on the truth and fact so tersely stated above. If a wool-grower should now ask the Oregonian editor the question asked it four years ago it would answer that the price of wool is affected by the duty and that a reduction of the duty would be followed by an equal reduction in the price, which would be ruin, ruin, ruin to the industry."

The country is reminded to-day of a fact that has seemed to be overlooked, that the name of the nominal Republican candidate is not Blaine, but Harrison. Yet as Mr. Harrison says, the mere name on the banner is not very important.

HEN. HARRISON. Editors Democrat: In his letter of acceptance, Gen. Ben. Harrison treats the Chicago platform very much like he treats the Chinese and labor questions. That is, his present views are at variance with his previous acts and declarations. In the case of the Chinese we find him favoring unrestricted immigration of the Mongolian with citizenship and full competition with American laboring men. In '77 we find him prosecuting distressed American laborers to such an extent that laborers of his own town and state have treasured up both his words and acts and hold them against him to-day, and will on the sixth of November give full vent to their views, of a man that will believe every public act and vote he ever given or made, thus nullifying all principles in the hope of satisfying the injured class of American citizens sufficiently to gain their suffrage. This pulling effort to pander to public sentiment appears also in his letter of acceptance in regard to the tariff plank of the platform he says he indorses, viz: We are not likely to be called upon to make a present choice between the surrender of the protective system and the entire repeal of the internal revenue," when he knows full well his party platform pledges them to an entire repeal of the internal revenue before surrendering any part of the protective system. Mr. Editor, this is the first time in the history of this government that trusts and monopolies have lifted their heads and boldly demanded of labor its suffrage to perpetuate a system of war taxes that have enriched their own coffers at the expense of labor, and the loading down the farms of the country of mortgages that can never be paid off. But we find in the East that the farmers and laborers are beginning to "see trees as men walking," the mists are breaking away and ere the 15th of November shall roll around they will be found "clothed and in their right minds." They will condemn at the polls by their ballots the party and monopolies that would still enslave them by an exorbitant tax, four-fifths of which goes into the pockets of these same trusts. The trusts, however, (which control the republican party by the way,) think laborers and farmers are fools and I believe they really think they can use them as cats in paws to pull out their (tax) chequins with, but they won't, and don't you forget it.

LABORER. We have entered upon no use of free trade. The reform we seek to inaugurate is predicated upon the utmost care for established industries, a jealous regard for the interests of American labor and a sincere desire to relieve the country from the injustice and danger of a condition which threatens evil to all the people of the land.—President Cleveland's Letter of Acceptance.
