THE POPULAR VOTE.

The following is the popular vote cast for President so far as reported:

Lists vote counts for various states including Alabama, Arkansas, California, Colorado, Connecticut, Delaware, Florida, Georgia, Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Kansas, Kentucky, Louisiana, Maine, Maryland, Massachusetts, Michigan, Minnesota, Mississippi, Missouri, Nebraska, Nevada, New Hampshire, New Jersey, New York, North Carolina, Ohio, Oregon, Pennsylvania, Rhode Island, South Carolina, Tennessee, Texas, Vermont, West Virginia, and Wisconsin.

As between Cleveland and Harrison the returns are official in all the states, except Massachusetts, Minnesota, Nebraska, Ohio and West Virginia. Cleveland's majority over Harrison will be about 120,000 or twice what it was four years ago.

Capt. Humphrey of this city does not view the prospect of getting into the office of U. S. Marshal next March with unmixed satisfaction. There are several dark clouds though not larger than a man's hand apparently hanging over his pathway that worries him to the least.

The Portland News has this advice to give office seekers who expect to get an appointment on the afternoon of the 4th of March next: "Let those who are now firing up model petitions, and moving heaven and earth for 'influence,' to commend places from President Harrison's administration, take heed from that old maxim which directs men to 'put not your trust in Princes.'"

The county court, in the matter of the recount in this Kanawha county, decided today to take the original count in Charleston City and St. Albans precincts, and reject the recount in these precincts, to throw out Lewiston and Coleburg precincts, and accept the recount in the balance of the precincts in the county.

Here is an open, dare-devil steal. On the first count McGinnis had a few votes over his democratic opponent, but on a recount made by a republican board the democrat was elected. Now the republican county court of Kanawha county deliberately proposes to steal a Congressman by throwing out precincts enough to do it.

The democratic party has the consolation that it alone of the two great organizations could afford to lose; its opponent had nothing to fight for but the offices. The protection cause was only a pretext that it would have deserted in a twinkling had there been anything to gain by such a course.

The San Francisco Examiner has interviewed quite a number of G. A. R. men in that state as to the charge brought against the order of being political in its character. Most of those interviewed denied the charge, though there were some who said it was true.

The battle is not over. The monopolies have won a victory, but at a fearful cost to themselves and to the country. Their triumph will be short lived. The forces of selfishness, ignorance and corruption will not forever prevail.

CITY CHARTER.

At the meeting of the city council last evening the report of the committee on the proposed amendments to the city charter, as already stated in the DEMOCRAT, was adopted. The council are anxious for our citizens to thoroughly understand the nature of the proposed amendments so that there will be no dissatisfaction on their passage by the legislature, and in response to a request we give the amendments as reported by the committee.

That section one of the charter describing and fixing the present city limits be extended from the present eastern boundary so as to include Hackleman's third addition to the city of Albany, and the property of H. Bryant, and south to include the Oregon-Pacific property (and round house), adjoining the present southern boundary of the city.

To amend section 13, chapter 12, so as to allow and indebtedness of \$5000 to be incurred.

To amend section 34, sub-section 34 of section 30 so as to provide for purchasing ground and improving the same for a public park.

Section 34, sub-section 2, to amend so as to permit a tax levy not to exceed eight mills.

To amend section 20 of section 34, so as to include obscene, abusive and profane language.

To amend sub-section 26, section 34, so as to provide for the sale or disposal of all animals taken up.

To amend sub-section 36, section 34, so as to provide for the punishment of cruelty to animals.

To amend sub-section 9 of section 3, so that in case any person having a liquor license violates the ordinance regulating the sale of liquors that on conviction before the recorder's court or by a jury of such violation, the council shall revoke such license.

To provide that all property within three blocks of any main sewer shall be connected with such main sewer.

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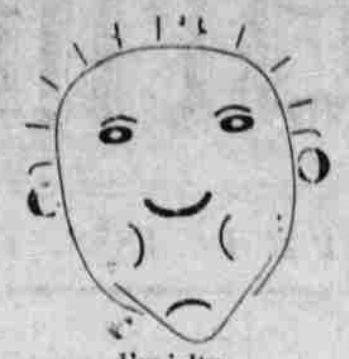

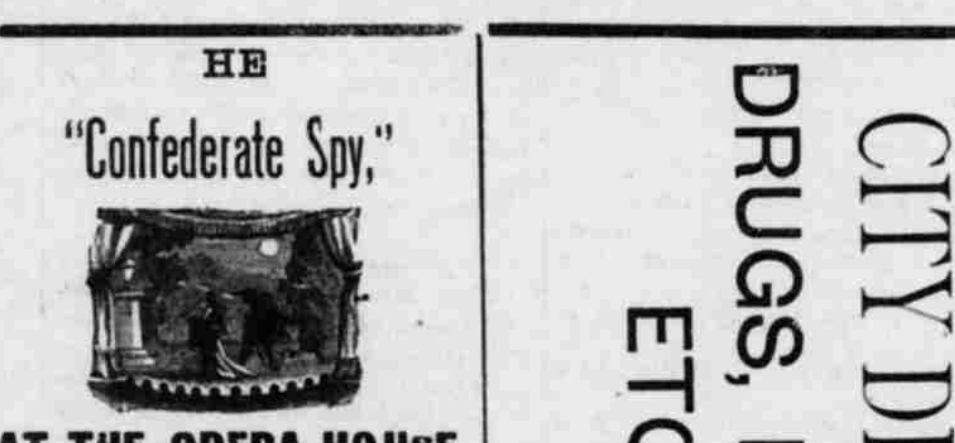
