

There are seventy men, all American citizens whose fortunes aggregate the big total of \$1,413,000,000. This exceeds by \$31,000,000 the total money circulation of the United States on the first day of the present month, according to the Treasury statement.

One southern iron company sold 55,561 tons of iron in the state of Ohio within a year past, and 6777 tons in Pennsylvania. These transactions locate the pinch in the shoe of the iron business with absolute precision.

United States Consul Mason of Marseilles writes to the state department that the effects of general and unrestrained drinking in France are now recognized as forming a basis of one of the gravest dangers which threaten the physical and moral welfare of the French people.

Congressman Henry Cabot Lodge of Massachusetts and J. G. Cannon, of Illinois are reported to be the most successful of all the office seekers who have the White House. "They get all they want and the promise of more."

Assembly of the Rhode Island Legislature has been accused of buying its seat. This is unparliamentary. No people can buy seats with impunity below the rank of United States Senator.

Returns from the election of School Superintendents in all the counties of Indiana on Monday last have been received here and Democratic gains are conceded. Two years ago the election resulted in the choice of forty-two Democrats and fifty Republicans. Now the Democrats have secured forty-nine Superintendents, the Republicans forty-two and the Independents one, a net gain of nine for the Democrats and a Republican loss of ten.

Senator Washburn, of Minnesota, is now engaged in denouncing the use of money in elections. Mr. Washburn has probably repented; for it is known that not many months ago he was charged with buying his way to the United States Senate, and it took the biggest whitewash brush in Minnesota, wielded by a Republican Legislature, to make him appear at all decent.

Solon Chase, the great Maine Greenbacker and proprietor of "them steers," was recently asked by a friend why he had not done a certain thing. "I've been thinking of it," said Mr. Chase, "but, you see, I've been enjoying religion too well; and when a man's enjoying religion so well he's apt to forget to do his duty."

Perhaps the cheekiest political incident of the current year is the cry of certain Democratic politicians who hid themselves in a protection knot hole during the last presidential canvass, asking the millions who are out of the knot hole to come in there and "get together." How can the masses "get together" in a place where there is no room for them?

Nearly every saloon keeper in Cincinnati belongs to the Saloon Keepers' Association. The Association has adopted a resolution binding every proprietor to violate the Sunday law and keep his saloon open definitely on Sundays. Any member who closes is to be fined \$10. The new system was inaugurated yesterday. It is a novel idea to impose a penalty on men for not rendering themselves liable to the penalties of the law. The saloon keepers are placed between two fires.

Fanny Kemble has written a novel. Think of it. She was one of the passengers on the first railroad train, and sat near Robert Stevens as he held the throttle of his queer little engine. Miss Kemble went home and wrote a charming description of her ride, describing the exhilarating sensation of rushing through the air at the rate of ten or twelve miles an hour. It is hard to realize that there is still living a person who saw the beginning of railroad travel and is still lively enough to write a novel. Verily, the world moves.

As society grows more and more of Sir Julian Paucotite, the new British Minister, it has more and more occasion to congratulate itself upon a really valuable acquisition to its circles. In private life Sir Julian is found to be an interesting man. He is good talker, and is not a bad raconteur. He can stand upon his dignity with a grand air, but as a rule, he is courteous to affability and kindliness. He is seen to the best advantage after dinner, when the strains of music are heard in the drawing room. He is a technical musician of high quality for an amateur. Whether Washington society will make the most of the British Minister's social qualities remains to be seen, but certain it is, as he has repeatedly expressed his opinion of it, that he looks forward with much pleasure to his term of residence in a country where he has already many close friends.

From a private letter received a few days ago from an American in London we get the following: "One day I strolled into Malvern Cemetery. I was anxious to see the grave of Jenny Lind. A large granite cross of simple design marks the last resting place of the glorious songstress. This cross rises from a plain granite block. On this is the following inscription: 'In loving memory of Jenny Lind, wife of Otto Goldschmidt, born at Stockholm, Oct. 6, 1802; died at Wexford, Malvern, Nov. 2, 1887. There is no other word than these. Some loving hands had laid upon the grave the day of my visit a laurel wreath interwined with violets and daffodils. It is a charming resting place that the diva lies in—a lovely spot resting at the foot of the Malvern Hills.'"

CHEEK AND GAIT.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

WASHINGTON, June 18.—The president made the following appointments to-day: William R. Bishop, agent at the Klammath agency, Oregon.

Lucius Fairchild, ex-commander in chief of the Grand Army of the Republic, has been appointed a member of the Sioux commission. Postmasters: John Corcoran, Denver, Colorado; John F. Rice, Orono, Colorado; Emory R. Leonard, Boise City, Idaho; Benjamin B. Burroughs, Pendleton, Oregon.

EVANS, Or., June 18.—The directors of the Sinaloa & Eastern Railway & Navigation Company had a meeting at the office of the secretary of the company in this city to-day. Mr. O. Hombower was elected general agent of the company, and it was resolved to make a preliminary survey of the line between Florence and this city immediately, and the president and secretary were authorized to employ competent engineers to survey the lines and complete the estimates for the same.

AN INDIANA STORM.—A destructive wind storm swept over Peru, Ind., this afternoon, doing great damage. Trees, fences and telegraph and telephone poles were leveled, and many dwellings injured.

SEATTLE, June 18.—Mayor Moran and Colonel J. C. Haines, commanding the First regiment, held a consultation to-day, and it was determined that it would be safe to withdraw the militia to-morrow. A part of the force will be taken off in the morning, and if no disturbance occurs, the remainder will be withdrawn at night.

OFFICIAL RETURNS.—The official board finished the counting of the returns of the constitutional convention election to-day. The Democrats have elected thirty-eight delegates and the Republicans thirty-five. Green, a labor candidate, is an old time Democrat, and the political preference of the one independent candidate elected is unknown. Putting the independent in the Republican column, the totals would be thirty-nine to thirty-six; no change in the majority of three.

THE TOTAL VOTE POLLED, taking the highest figures for each opposing candidate, is 10,597, of which the Democrats polled 5366 and the Republicans 5211. The labor candidate received 288 votes and the independent 360, making the full vote 11,245.

A KANSAS CYCLOPE.—St. LOUIS, June 17.—Additional advice about the disaster in Kansas from the wind and rain storm that visited that State, is that twenty-two and four children drowned. Uniontown is a place of 600 inhabitants, in the midst of a thickly settled country. It is feared the loss of life is heavier than reported. As the wires are down for fifteen miles on either side nothing can be learned.

WINNIEP, June 17.—Last night the chief of police arrested Martin Burke, alias Delaney, wanted for complicity in the Cronin murder. He was boarding the Eastern express and had a ticket for Liverpool.

A BIG PRICE.—HELENA, Mont., June 17.—An auction sale of Helena sewer bonds, to the amount of \$130,000, took place to-day. The bidding was spirited, representatives of leading houses in Chicago, St. Paul, Topeka, Kansas City, New York and Cleveland being present. The lowest bid was a 4 per cent premium, but the entire lot was struck off to A. W. Halley, the agent for N. W. Harris, of Chicago, for \$7720 premium within 87 1/2 per cent, premium, which is for the war? Did they cry out? No, they do not need any "when there were quotas of soldiers to be filled?
