HIGHEST IN THE WORLD.

The project of the Odd Fellows to build the highest and most costly office building in Chicago, and that means in the world, seems to be well under way.

The entire structure is 556 feet in height, while the main portion is to be as high as the Masonic Temple.

There are two main arch entrances which open into a mosaic floored rotunda. In the four corners of this rotunda will be located the banks of elevators.

The work of securing a site, a much more difficult feature of the undertaking than the work involved in making plans is progressing.

The National Life Building, just east of Arcade court, is just one half of the required property. This is owned by Higginson & Furber, who stand ready not only to make a satisfactory lease but to give the scheme financial support.

From the beginning of our government its policy has been to maintain a large standing army. Commissioned officers have clamored for greater appropriations and more men, as these will increase their own importance.

The increase of 1891 over 1890 was \$7,993,324. The increase of which the Journal boasts is in the importations of free goods while there has been an actual decrease in importations of dutiable goods of \$4,983,324.
