FAVOR BRITISH STRAITS... A type of dream has been invented in England by which compressed gas is utilized instead of powder as a propelling force.

The eight-ton synthetic coal made in the Pennsylvania exhibit at the World's Fair was sold for \$200 to H. A. Morse.

In Moscow the winter cold is so intense that it freezes quail, while the summer temperature is as high as that of Naples.

During the Fair the train wheel carried 1,453,614 persons. Gross receipts were \$7,000,000.

According to the London Board of Trade reports increased during October \$30,000, and exports decreased \$350,000, as compared with imports and exports of October, '92.

Superior, the largest fresh water lake, is 400 miles long, 60 wide and has an area of 20,000 square miles, or about half that of Missouri. Its surface is 635 feet above sea level.

Land is not so dirt cheap in America now as it was when Lord Baltimore's company bought thousands of acres of fine ground for less than that number of glass beads, including the site of the city of Christiana.

For which was paid one iron kettle of the bigness of five quarts or thereabouts. Roger Williams bought Rhode Island for "forty fathoms of white beads, string, and it is only about 255 years since the site of New Haven, Ct., was bought for twelve cents of English cloth, twelve pounds of mixed metal, twelve hives, twelve hatchets, twelve porringers, twenty-four knives and some French knives and spoons."

Probably the only business transaction on record that beat these is that of an American, who bought a parcel of land in the state of Virginia for a mere trifle.

It is said that the diamond mine at New Jagersfontein, South Africa, was taken during the first half of this year by a syndicate who contract expiring mid-1904.

Just before sunrise on the day of the contract the largest white diamond in the world was found. It is three inches long, from 1 1/2 to 2 1/2 inches thick and weighs 97 1/2 carats, or 7 1/2 ounces avoirdupois.

The late Cyrus W. Field made an attempt some years ago to maintain a monument for John A. Dix, the British spy in our Revolution, whose capture led to the discovery of Benjamin Arnold's treason.

Mr. Field's attempt was frustrated by some one or more parties, who in the night defaced and destroyed the proposed memorial.

There has been reason for the fact that no monument had then been erected to Nathan Hale, an American spy, who was captured and hanged by the British in New York.

His last words were, "I regret that I have but one life to give to my country."

A statue bearing this inscription has been erected on the spot where the gallows stood. It was unveiled Nov. 21, the twentieth anniversary of the day when the British evacuated New York city.

From the known properties of aluminum to resist the action of salt water, it is being used as an alloy, in parts to other metals for bolts for boats.

They are eminent treasurers, their employers say, and do not spend more than their salary. And so it is in every sphere of labor. They prove themselves worthy of the trust committed to them, and are not unfrequently entering new fields of labor, and are not confined to their own department and petty clerks, but are advancing into the regions beyond. They are becoming leaders in all the moral and religious movements of the day, and are making their influence felt in the elevation and advancement of the human race. And the time may not be far distant, when their influence in the moral world will be felt as never before.

Already two states have granted them the right of suffrage; and it is hard to tell how soon other states may fall in line and female suffrage be extended over the whole country. This will, doubtless, depend in some measure, upon the results of the movement in Wyoming and Colorado. The intelligent and influential women in these states exercise the right granted them in the purification of corruption in high places, and in the breaking up of political rings, the day may not be far distant, when women's influence at the ballot-box will be felt from Maine to Oregon, and from Canada to the Gulf of Mexico.

I am not advocating woman's right; I am only speaking of the course of events in the past and present and the future. From the days of Adam down to the present time, woman's influence has been everywhere felt in the world, but nowhere more than in the present time. In America this last decade of the nineteenth century of the Christian era. Not more than fifty years ago, it was a renowned power in the church, in the school room, through the press, in the temperance cause, and in all the movements of this progressive age. And the greater the mental discipline and consequent qualifications of women for any sphere of action, the greater her influence in all the onward and upward movements of this great nation and the world.
