ALBANY'S ESCAPE.

Whether the early missionary training of Miss Ah Wing had been allowed to lapse, or that the Chinese maiden's spirit was elevated to such a pitch that she was able to escape from the clutches of the task of speeding to Albany, Or., handicapped with eight cans of opium, was not divulged before the State Commissioner Woodward this morning, when Miss Wing and her accomplice, a Chinaman of the highlander type, were arraigned for examination on the charge of smuggling.

This morning Customs Inspectors Church and Krieger, stationed at the union depot, while keeping an official eye on the 3:30 south-bound train, had their attention attracted to a young, good looking China-woman whose semi-American dress named her as a graduate from some mission school. Following at some distance behind the woman was a Chinaman carrying a satchel and a man on reaching the ticket office purchased two fares for Albany, then making a close scrutiny of the ticket and evidently assuring herself that the coast was clear she signalled for the Chinaman to follow her.

The satchel got no further than the train gate, when it was seized by Church and Krieger, its carrier setting up a loud wail in Chinese. While the inspectors were endeavoring to open the locked valve, Miss Ah Wing joined the party, and in English demanded to know by what right they were interfering with her servant. The inspectors disclaimed any intention of interfering with the contents of the satchel, and she then requested the mission graduate to open it. This she refused to do until the officers prepared to take up the Chinaman's satchel, and then reluctantly produced the key, the contents of the satchel proving to be eight cans of opium. The woman and her companion were placed under arrest, and Attorney George Stout representing the prossecutor and demanding an immediate examination. The only testimony offered was that of Miss Wing, who said she had been given the opium by a white man whose identity she was unable to give. The Chinaman refused to testify, and the case was evidently depending on the superior linguistic of Miss Wing. Both were held in \$100 cash bonds, which the woman immediately furnished. Her companion, however, was unable to secure bail and was sent to the county jail.
