A Chickamauga Letter.

The following letter in the Ann Arbor Courier from Will Campbell, an Albany young man, who, while attending college at Ann Arbor Mich., responded to the country's call for soldiers, will be read with interest by the DEMOCRAT's readers:

CAMP THOMAS, CHICKAMAUGA, GA.

May 20, 1898.

EDITOR COURIER:—Michigan came to the front again today, and proved to the world that it is time of war she is always on her knees. This time she has done the war part and crossed the border with Pennsylvania. Michigan has established a guard over a certain well, and forbidden others to intrude, while Pennsylvania claimed the water to be of equal right to all and special privilege of none. About two hundred soldiers of the Keystone state attempted to possess the pump, but the Wolverine guard stood fast and declared he would not allow the first man that advanced upon him. They advanced upon him, however, but when Lieut. Wells, of Company B, gave the command "guard in line fix bayonets forward march double-time charge!" Michigan's victory was as complete as that of Admiral Dewey.

Saturday morning Michigan and Pennsylvania came together again in a battle. Neither of the commanding officers knew the movements of the other, and it was a catch-as-catch-can fight to the finish of a circuit of eight miles.
