Ruling the Philippines.

The question, "Can we Americanize
the Philippines?" is considered in the
light of twenty years of personal experi-
ence on the islands by Oden E. Edwards
in a paper to the Independent. Mr. Ed-
wards was, from 1862 to 1888, member
of an American firm having business with
the Philippines and for twenty years
of the time was a resident at Manila. He
was U. S. consul during the administration
of President Pierce, was Danish con-
sul for a much longer period, and was in
constant contact with the Spanish and
native officials. His knowledge of Philip-
pine affairs and the people is judged
from the fact that he served upon com-
mittees raised by the government for the
purpose of formulating the financial and
economic policy of the islands.

Mr. Edwards declares unequivocally
that the natives cannot be, in any sense,
of the time, so trained and elevated in
citizenship as to be fit for our form of
government. Years of good, honest and
just government, such as the manage-
ment of village affairs by the elders of
the village, might be safely introduced
to this native. Each of the twenty-five
provinces or districts on the island of
Luzon could be governed by an American
either a regular army or navy officer, as-
sisted by an advisory council, chosen
from among the head men of the district
and by two or three young Americans,
who had been educated in our schools
and who could be safely trusted to ex-
amine at home. This, it will be noted,
is a form of government for the rural
districts modeled somewhat after the
English rule in India.

For the larger towns and Manila itself
some modification of this plan would be
required, admitting of representation by
the more educated natives, both of Ma-
nyal and Spanish descent, but, in the
main, government must for years come
from above, not from below.

On one point Mr. Edwards is emphatic,
it is an absolute necessity that there be
no touch of the spoils system in our gov-
ernment of the Philippines. If we cannot
govern them honestly, through a
permanent staff of highly trained, well
paid officials, selected for merit and for
merit only, we must abandon the idea of
governing the islands or any part of
them. The spoils system, as we have
ruined Spain and caused every rebel-
lion in her colonies, and we cannot repeat her
sin without incurring an equal punish-
ment.

The climatic objection to Americaniz-
ing the islands by settlement is insur-
mountable. It is not the great heat, but
the steady, antiseptic heat, which ex-
hausts the strength of Europeans or Ameri-
cans. Year by year the European or
American living in the Philippines loses
something of his vitality, and instead of
being acclimated at the end of ten years
is less fit to endure the heat or exposure
to the sun than he was when he first
arrived.

The children born of these American
or European parents will thrive for four
or five years and then must be sent
home or they will grow degenerated.

MANILA, April 7.—The Cuban general
