Late News in Short Form.

Grant's Charge.
MANILA, Oct. 6.—General Fred Grant, with three companies of the Fourth Infantry, two companies of the Fourteenth Infantry and a band of scouts attached to the former regiment, advanced from Iloilo this morning, driving the insurgents from the entire west bank of the Iloilo river. Three Americans were wounded. It is estimated that 10 Filipinos were killed.

Big Storms.
MANILA, Oct. 6.—The transport Siam, which left Honolulu 31 days ago, encountered typhoons early this week. One lasted 40 hours. Most of the cargo, which was on deck, was swept overboard. All the boats were smashed in, and the steamer rolled tremendously in the trough of the sea, although the officers made all efforts to bring her about. The masts were hurled from side to side and frightfully mangled and dismembered. Their legs and necks were broken.

A Big Fleet.
WASHINGTON, Oct. 6.—When the eight vessels ordered to Manila yesterday reach Admiral Watson, he will have under his command one battle-ship, two monitors, one armored cruiser, seven protected and auxiliary cruisers, and 27 gunboats. The United States will then be superior in naval strength in the Pacific to Russia which stands next to Great Britain.

Just Waiting.
LONDON, Oct. 6.—There has been almost a complete dearth of news from South Africa today. The few dispatches received recording military movements at various points tend to confirm the belief that President Kruger will restrain any forward movement by the Boers, unless they are fired upon or war is actually declared.

The Alaska Boundary.
CHICAGO, Oct. 6.—A special to the Chronicle from Washington says: The state department was informed today from London that the British foreign office had ratified the Alaska provisional boundary line as agreed upon by Secretary Hay and Mr. Tower, British charge d'affaires.

Price of Hops.
WOODBRIDGE, Oct. 6.—W. H. Townsend sold to Nels & Faber today his entire crop, 125 bales, or 23,647 pounds, at 9 1/2 cents.

Complaint is general from growers that hops are weighing out exceedingly light. The average is 10 to 11 pounds per box.
