Mr. Albert Cole, who has been in Eastern Oregon for some months past, arrived home overland, Monday evening.

V. B. Goin has been engaged to teach school in the Richardson district and will begin his duties as teacher next Monday.

Last Monday Wm. McDonald who lives near town had the misfortune to lose quite a lot of grain. The grain was piled in the field and covered with straw and by some means the straw caught on fire and the grain was burned up.

Last week Riley Shelton sold the Ruthy Crabtree place about six miles southeast of Scio to Mr. Alois Vana, a gentleman who arrived here with his family a short time ago, from Olivia, Minn. The place contains 113 acres and sold for \$1850.
