Late News in Short Form.

**Some Fighting.**  
MANILA, Oct. 28.—General Young's column, which left San San Isidro a daybreak, moving northward in the direction of Santa Rosa, encountered the enemy strongly entrenched just beyond the Tubatin river. A brisk fight ensued, and the rebels were repulsed. Two Americans were killed and one wounded. Pursuit was impossible, owing to the width and depth of the stream.

**The War Situation.**  
LONDON, Oct. 28.—The war situation this morning presents no new features. It is presumed in Natal that the Boers are reconstructing their plans, and that the English are resting, but telegrams from Ladysmith, at express rates, still occupy 48 hours in transmission to London, and, therefore, it is not possible that something is happening.

**A Murderer Hanged.**  
ST. LOUIS, Oct. 27.—A special to the Post Dispatch from Dallas, Tex., says: Rev. C. E. Morrison was hanged at noon today at Neron, for wife-murder. He met his death resignedly.

### MISFITS.

A report comes down from the upper Calapoosia country to the effect that a certain Albany lawyer was recently noticed, located for several hours on a deer stand awaiting the approach of the wild and wary buck.—Browsville Times. He got him too.

The following funny item is at the expense of the newspaper men:  
The estate of the late Andrew Jenkins who was editor and publisher of the Otag Press, has been appraised at \$1,795.64. It is easy enough to imagine how he accumulated the sixty four cents, but where in the world did he ever get that one thousand seven hundred and ninety-five dollars from?

It cost only \$642.95 for Oregon's bucolic governor and his staff to go to San Francisco to meet the soldiers, included in the amount being the fare of the governor and the other members, and it is known that the Governor at least traveled regularly on a pass. The Oregon soldiers returning home paid their own fare. The Salem Sentinel, a republican paper, says comment is unnecessary.

In view of the exaggerated reports about Dawson the actual facts are very refreshing:  
The work of taking the annual census of Dawson has just been completed by the N W M P. It has been done as thoroughly as possible under the shifting conditions obtaining there. According to the footings of the several returns of the census taken, the population of Dawson is figured up at 4445. Of these 3659 are males and 786 females, included in the total are 163 children under the age of 14 years. During the period of one month, from August 26 to September 26, according to notes kept by the police, it is figured that 1736 people left Dawson for Nome and the outside, and within the same time 1358 people arrived in Dawson, the number of departures over arrivals within that time being but 378.

**WILL STUDY LAW.**—Mr. W. W. Bailey, our South Side merchant, contemplates gradually selling out of the mercantile business, and entering the study of law. Mr. Bailey is a graduate of Commercial Law at Lawrence, Kansas, and taught several years ago in the Albany College, being at the time principal professor in the Commercial Department of said college. He will sit out an office in a part of his store on the South Side, where, besides attending to his duties as Justice of the Peace, he will give prompt attention to the drawing of deeds, mortgages, and other conveyancing. Mr. Bailey has made arrangements so that any person desirous of leaving with him any legal matters such as foreclosure of mortgages, actions, or suits at law, or the settlement of estates, requiring the attention of an Attorney in County, Probate or Circuit Court, may do so, as the same will be promptly attended to by Mr. Geo. W. Wright, Attorney at Law and Counselor at Albany, Oregon.—Browsville Times.

It is reported that Mr. Perkins the man, with the Broken leg and the small-pox, at Mrs. Moon's will probably die. Walter Scott, who returned last Saturday from Eastern Oregon is also reported to have the varioloid. A sister has just recovered from the chicken pox.

Chinese pheasants are now somewhat scarce, but there are said to be plenty of snipe. One day this week Mr. John Robison made snipe a specialty and killed eight, but in so doing he shot seventy-five times. We have the word of a friend of his for the fact.

The Salem Sentinel says editorially: A perfect remedy and modifier or ameliorator of smallpox is the free use of lemons. We doubt if that disease amounts to anything if a little care be taken. It is not nearly so dangerous as measles or scarletina. Cider vinegar may be taken if lemons be not on hand. At some Kansas towns cider vinegar was used this year with perfect success as preventive. Avoid meats and all fats and like diets.

The bicycle is a bone of contention all over the world in the effort to find out what class it belongs to. Recently an English court has decided that a bicycle is not baggage, since baggage is what a passenger carries, while a bicycle is something which carries the passenger. It would follow, accordingly, that a passenger might as reasonably ask that his horse be transported free as baggage as that his bicycle should be taken on the same terms.

### SATURDAY NIGHT THOUGHTS

The Boer war continues at the head of the column attracting more attention just now than any thing else in the world. It is already evident so far as can be learned that the English are too much for the Boers. And this was to be expected. The English are an advanced people in their methods, though behind the times in their imperialistic manner of doing things. As fighters they are next to the people of the United States. Mr. Kruger might have saved himself a great deal of trouble by fixed it up with England the best way he could and depended on the Lord in a case like this. Bullets go just as aimed.

The Philippine war has become a good deal of a game of a political foot ball, and men are trying to make Presidents out of it in different ways. A campaign in the first place fast from the start would have ended the contest in a few months, but the policy pursued was a slow one, and it could not work against the fabric scheme of Aquinaldo. That is the long and short of it.
