The first half ended 3 to 2 in favor of the Orange, being a goal apiece from the field and a goal for Orange on account of a foul. In the second half Miss Morrison was unable to play. The Blacks won though by the superior work at the goal of Misses Clem and Murphy who threw six baskets, one was thrown for the Orange. Total score Black 14, Orange 5. Under previous announcement this makes the Blacks the first team and the Orange second.

The playing showed excellent training on the part of Prof. Tait. When the team work is fully developed the college will have a strong team, with which to compete with other colleges.
