Big Capture.

MANILA, Dec. 2, 9:20 A. M.—General Condon surrendered 800 officers and men with rifles, several Americans and 70 Spanish prisoners and the garrison at La Ombong, province of Nueva Vizcaya, to Lieutenant Monroe, with 50 men of the Fourth cavalry.

CLEVELAND, Dec. 1.—Concerning the reports which have been in circulation for several weeks past to the effect that Senator Hanna would not succeed himself as chairman of the national republic committee, it can be stated on the authority of Hanna's most intimate friends that he has no desire to manage another campaign and that unless very strong pressure is brought to bear upon him, he will, in all probability, decline to do so.

After Roberts.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 1.—The tide against Roberts is overwhelming. The demand upon members of congress to prevent his retaining a seat in the house has grown to enormous proportions, and is swelling day by day. Prominent men in every congressional district are writing letters to their members in such terms and numbers as to make them feel that unless they vote Roberts out they may not be elected next year.

More McKinleyism.

CHICAGO, Dec. 1.—The News says today: A \$200,000,000 trust is in contemplation. There is every prospect that the American Sugar Refining Company, and all so-called independent sugar refineries, will be consolidated. H. O. Howe, meyer, of the sugar combine, has, it is understood, secured options on the Arbuckle Sugar Combine, the D. Scher concern, and outside plants in Boston and New Orleans.

Big Storm.

ROCKFORD, Tex., Dec. 1.—Reports from points on the gulf in this section show that the damage to property and loss of life by the recent storm were much greater than first reported. A number of small fishing craft are missing, together with their crews. The bodies of James Sanders and two other men not yet identified have been found in the mouth of St. Charles bay.

Absolute Silence.

LONDON, Dec. 2.—Absolute silence has fallen over affairs in South Africa. The

war office has not received Lord Methuen's casualty list. The public and the press, hitherto patient, are beginning to murmur at the apparently needless delay which keeps many families in a state of suspense.

Judge F. A. Chenoweth died at his home at Kings Valley on Wednesday, at the age of eighty years. He was one of the pioneer lawyers of the state, and at one time did a large practice in Benton county. Besides he was prominent in politics. Judge Chenoweth was well-known in Albany. For several years his has been very poor and his mind weakened.

Isa Veva Crocker died in the hospital at Salem yesterday evening from the effects of an operation for the appendicitis. Miss Crocker was attending Albany College when taken down with the disease. She went to the home of her aunt in Turner and thence to the hospital. Her parents were in California and have been sent for.

Secretary of State Dunbar, in second year with section 65 of Hill's annotated laws of Oregon, has made a complete compilation of the election laws of the state, including the registration law and reapportionment bills passed last winter, and has turned the manuscript over to the state printer for preparation in pamphlet form. The time allowed for forwarding the election laws and supplies to county clerks will expire January 1st. There are 792 election precincts in the state, to each of which three copies of the election laws must be furnished.
